#### GARDEN CLUB OF AMERICA ANNUAL MEETING

#### DALLAS, TEXAS

#### APRIL 7-9, 2002

I was so excited to be a delegate to the 89<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the GCA in Dallas, Texas. I arrived Sunday morning without incident, only to find out later that right after I arrived, the airport was closed for the remainder of the afternoon due to thunderstorms!

My first meeting was a delegate workshop where we sat at assigned tables of 10. Who should arrive and sit right next to me but Margy, my house guest from the Zone III meeting held here in Bedford last fall. We had a lively discussion at our table, covering issues such as membership, meeting attendance and fund raising. I learned that the GCA clubs range in size from 20 to 100 active members, and zones can cover a 50 mile radius or as in the case of Zone 12, cover 5 states: California, Colorado, Washington, Oregon and New Mexico. Several clubs even have men members and hold evening meetings.

The dinner at Eddie Deen's was an authentic Texas barbecue with line dancing, steer sitting and even a command stage performance by various GCA ladies including yours truly.

The following morning was the GCA business meeting. The accomplishments of members across the country were highlighted and applauded. The Founders Fund winner was the project of opening the secret garden of the Awbury Arboretum in Philadelphia PA, proposed by the Garden Club of Philadelphia. We then went to the Trammell & Margaret Crow Collection of Asian Art, a lovely museum started by these civic-minded Dallas residents who the next evening at the awards dinner received a GCA Medal for their innovative work in landscape architecture in urban areas.

The grazing dinner at the Dallas Museum of Art was lots of fun as it included an "Art in Bloom" -style flower show centered around risqué paintings. The spectacular best-in-show winner was an interpretation of "The Rape of Europa."

The Horticulture and Conservation meetings the following morning were informative and inspiring. Joan Murphy, GCA National Affairs & Legislation Chair talked about hypoxia, specifically in the Mississippi River delta where there is a "dead zone" the size of Massachusetts. The GCA has been involved in farm bill legislation; run-off from farms is a huge factor in this problem. Dr. Tom Lovejoy, Senior Advisor to the President and former Director of the World Wildlife Fund discussed the biochemical warfare between the plant and insect world. He reiterated the fact about the tragic elimination of so many species over time, due to habitat destruction.

Our final speaker was our friend Ken Druse who spoke on propagation, the subject of his latest book. He too, has "been there, killed that" but he inspired us all to "create" new plants and gave us the helpful hint of using turkey grit along with our growing medium. He pointed out that when shopping at Home Depot for plants, remember that "there is no such thing as a dead bargain."

These meetings were followed by luncheon at the Dallas Country Club and tours of private gardens. Each one was more over-the-top than the last! The final awards dinner was truly spectacular with fabulous centerpieces of tulips and amaryllis and a glittering array of medal award winners who were honored amid huge applause.

In conclusion, the meeting was loads of fun as I learned a lot and made a number of new friends, many of whom will be here next May when they travel to the 2003 GCA Annual meeting in Rye. One final Texas quote, "A penny saved, is a woman lost."

#### **STANDING COMMITTEES**

#### ANNUAL REPORTS, JUNE 2001 – JUNE 2002

#### CIVIC AFFAIRS AND CONSERVATION

The Civic Affairs and Conservation committee continues to emphasize the importance of land preservation and environmental education. To this end, we have spent the year revisiting and walking the sanctuaries of our community. The naturalists on staff as well as various board members have given us presentations on the history of each sanctuary so that we may better appreciate the steps taken in the past to create and preserve these important properties.

To wit, we walked the new Audubon sanctuary called 'Bylane', given by BGC member Mrs. Morgan Parker, The Beaver Dam Sanctuary, The Butler-Meyer Preserve, The Marsh Sanctuary, The Mianus River Gorge, and Ward Pound Ridge Reservation with the Luquer-Marble Wildflower Garden and Trailside Museum.

In addition to educating ourselves, we have reached out to our community in the following ways:

#### Community Garden:

We installed six large planters along the outside wall of the Fox Senior Center of Mt. Kisco. We planted them with purple and white Japanese iris, as well as King Alfred daffodils. Annuals are given each year to the Senior Center citizens by the local elementary schools. The planters have been nicely maintained, and our goals have been achieved: 1) to provide access to gardening for those without, 2) to enhance the appearance of the building using horticulture, and 3) to demonstrate a use for the products of our recycling efforts at OBEX.

#### OBEX:

After 12 years of dedicated recycling efforts on behalf of our membership, we are sorry to report that due to a lack of post-recycled product sales, OBEX has ceased to operate. While we remain hopeful that they may re-emerge, we have suspended indefinitely our donations

As this is most likely the last annual report that will mention OBEX, I would like to give a quick synopsis of its history with the BGC. *The Wall Street Journal* ran an article on the opening OBEX in 1990. Betty Wamsley and Mary Helen Kennedy read the article and immediately saw the importance of such an organization as well as how the BGC could help get it going. Betty and Mary Helen started encouraging the members of the BGC to save all their plastic (not just #1 and #2), and Conservation Committee members began carting it to Stamford once a month.

True to BGC spirit, the great idea was not to lie secret within our bounds; the Rusticus Garden Club soon joined the fun. Betty Wamsley and Mary Helen Kennedy got Zone II Representative Carol Stoddard on board, and Rye and others joined as well. OBEX was now known among the local garden clubs; the Greenwich clubs added their plastic to the growing pile.

That was over a decade ago, and while we are disappointed to see the business falter, we are proud of our membership for their commitment for such a long time, and we are especially proud of the leadership and foresight of Betty Wamsley and Mary Helen Kennedy for recognizing the importance of this conservation project for all of our communities.

#### Town Meetings:

We are grateful for Tanya Lowe's continued fine efforts to organize and monitor the town meetings' schedule. This was the first year in which the entire membership was invited to see how our local boards operate on our behalf. We are now organized into monthly teams with able captains trained personally by Tanya Lowe. This remains one of the most important projects of the Civic Affairs and Conservation Committee as our input on and knowledge of the future of the development of Bedford is key to the quality of our lives.

#### Adopt-a-Road:

We continued the cleanup of our section of Route 22 under the cheerful guidance of our hardhat supplier and leader Betty Wamsley. We thank all who participated in keeping the main artery through Bedford clean of roadside debris. And we give a special thank you to Connie and Gordon Hamilton for doing a spontaneous cleanup one particularly messy month.

#### Public Lecture:

Our February Regular Meeting featured Conservation speaker Bonnie Harper-Lore. She is the Plant Community Ecologist for the Federal Highway Administration and the editor of *Green Roadsides Newsletter*. She spoke about roadside plantings and what local organizations and individuals can do to beautify the twelve million acres of national highways. Bonnie Harper-Lore's book, <u>Roadside Use of Native Plants</u>, provides state-by-state references on the use of native plants and how they should be used to beautify highway projects. As a direct result of her talk, the Conservation Committee is working with County Legislator Ursula LaMotte to ensure proper native plantings along the newly resurfaced areas of 684.

#### National Affairs and Legislation:

As co-chairman of the Conservation Committee, Denise Santomero represented the BGC at two meetings. In February, she went to Washington to the annual National Affairs and Legislation Meeting of the GCA, meeting with legislators to ensure adequate understanding of the conservation issues of the GCA.

As a direct result of those meetings in Washington, the Conservation Committee supplied letters at the February meeting for the membership to sign that highlighted current legislation on which the GCA has a position paper. These issues concerned the Department of the Interior's budget for Parks and Recreation and ANWAR.

Denise Santomero also represented the BGC at a Zone III Conservation Meeting held in the Adirondacks in May. This set of meetings served as a forum to discuss issues prevalent in New York and our local areas in particular. Like the Washington meetings, there were many fine speakers to educate the attendees on issues, as well as opportunities for the attendees to share their own garden club's efforts with their garden club counterparts and the speakers.

#### Bedford 2000 – Shaping the Future:

Starting in 1995, Caroline Niemczyk led the Civic Affairs and Conservation Committee in hosting a series of forums on public initiatives entitled "Bedford 2000 – Shaping the Future". Over the next three years, four more "Bedford 2000" meetings were organized by the Civic Affairs and Conservation Committee; they were attended by hundreds of town people and officials, and were covered extensively in the local press. As a result of these forums, the BGC helped define the debate on shaping the future development and character of Bedford; this in turn led to the establishment of the Bedford Coalition by 1998. The momentum generated by the Bedford Coalition, originally comprised of 17 Bedford groups, continues to this day.

In 1999, the town of Bedford established a Master Plan review committee, and invited three BGC members to join. The Master Plan review committee continues to work with the Bedford Coalition to accomplish their mutual goals: 1. Maintaining community character by ensuring a) open space, b) dirt roads, and c) preservation of the town's natural beauty; 2. Affordable housing and 3. Land and historic preservation.

As a direct result of the Master Plan review committee's work, in conjunction with the Bedford Coalition, in November 2000, a Referendum was passed to endorse the Bedford town resources for expenditure on open space of \$3 million, and to establish soon after a town Open Space Advisory Committee to prioritize the purchase of open parcels for the town.

Originally spearheaded by Caroline Niemczyk, this enormous and important undertaking was the fine work of the Civic Affairs and Conservation Committee over the past seven years, and we are proud of and grateful for capable leadership. Notable members with foresight and commitment include Tanya Lowe, Anne French, Robin Purcell, Betty Wamsley, Nancy Vincent, Ann McDuffie. The Bedford Coalition and the Master Plan committee continue to be guided by many BGC members. We thank them for their hard work and tireless efforts, as they work today and into the future for the preservation of our town and the quality of our lives.

#### **Audubon Sanctuaries**

HUNT SANCTUARY: This Sanctuary consists of 318 acres. There are 220 acres with trails marked. There is some thought that there be small programs for education purposes in 'Bylane', the house that belonged to Mrs. Parker. She contributed 120 acres to the Sanctuary just recently.

PALMER LEWIS SANCTUARY: This Sanctuary consists of 26 acres on Route 121. One trail has access from Route 121.

FRANKLIN FELS SANCTUARY: Located in North Salem, with 205 acres, reposting is taking place. A bridge over a brook is being built. There are plans for a parking area and otherwise just general improvement.

#### The Beaver Dam Sanctuary

In May 2002, Beaver Dam sanctuary became Grantee for an easement held jointly with Westchester Land Trust, of 5.870 acres adjacent to Beaver Dam River and connecting with the land given by Jan Montgomery to the Sanctuary. The Grantor of the easement is William Kelly Simpson. At the same time, Mr. Simpson gave a trail easement to Bedford Riding Lanes Association. This easement is also held in tandem with the Westchester Land Trust.

The property is owned by Mr. Simpson and any future owner will continue as Grantor, bound by the terms of the easements that continue in perpetuity. The Sanctuary is grateful for Mr. Simpson's generosity and significant far-sightedness.

#### The Butler-Meyer Preserve of the Nature Conservancy

The Arthur W. Butler Sanctuary was the first preserve donated to The Nature Conservancy and the first wildlife refuge in the Town of Bedford. Later the Meyer Preserve was added to the Conservancy land thus becoming The Butler-Meyer Preserve of the Nature Conservancy.

Each year many come to wander through the forested preserve criss-crossed with historic stone walls. Each and every season has a special treat for the visitors starting in early spring with lovely wildflowers and birds returning to the area; summer offers a dense canopy and busy time for an abundance of wildlife; fall has the gorgeous colors of the varieties of trees and shrubs as well as the Hammershlag Hawkwatch. From the hawkwatch one can enjoy views of the Taconic Mountains and observe a variety of raptors as they head south for the winter. Special programs are scheduled for the midend of September with an Audubon "hawkwatcher" on hand to identify the magnificent birds.

Please come and experience the wonders of spring flowers, the lushness of summer, the marvelous fall foliage and the stillness of winter.

#### The Marsh Sanctuary

Here's how to get started using the Archives of American Gardens:

- Go to the GCA website: www.gcamerica.org
- Click on **Members Only**.
- user id: gcamember, password: compost. On the next screen
- Click on GH&D Archives of American Gardens. On the next screen
- Click on **Information Form**. Print the last three pages of the Information Form. It lists 149 landscape features. Go back to the GH&D page where you found the forms.
- Click Directions to the AAG Site at the Smithsonian.
- Then click on the Smithsonian link: www.siris.si.edu
- Click Search under Archives & Manuscripts
- On the next screen, under **Keyword**, type in a landscape feature (or a town or an estate or a landscape architect or a garden owner) in the first box.
- In the second box, **Keywords Anywhere**, you can highlight a specific type of search (such as name or subject) if you like.
- In the third box, use the pop-up menu and highlight **Archives of American Gardens**.
- In the fourth box, choose the way you want to **Sort** the items (the sort I like to use is **Date-Earliest to Latest** because I love to see the glass lantern slides.)
- Click on **Search**. If you don't see a thumbnail image on the right side (not all of the slides are on the internet yet), scroll down until you do.
- Click on View **Long Record** on the left side of the screen to retrieve the full catalog record that has more information about the garden and the image. Scroll down until you see all of the keywords under which this image is cataloged -they are underlined. Click on any term to do a new search and find all of the photos of that garden, all of the gardens of that designer or all of the gardens in that town.

From the archives, photos of the cannery that operated during World War II have come to light. These and other photos have been identified and where fragility demanded copies have been made.

#### IN MEMORIAM

#### Mary Cluett Belden

Mrs. William Allen Belden, a member of the Bedford Garden Club since 1972, died on April 3, 2002 after a long illness. Born Mary Cluett in 1929, she spent much of her life in the Bedford area. Mrs. Belden graduated from Chatham Hall and from Bryn Mawr College with honors. She spent her junior year in Paris at the Sorbonne and was fluent in French, Italian and German. A love of travel and attention to architecture inspired Mrs. Belden in her long career, as an interior designer.

Mrs. Belden is survived by her husband, William A. Belden, and her daughter, Catherine Belden Nail. She will be remembered by the garden club for her energetic spirit and her love of beauty and design. She was a gifted pianist and frequently entertained in her home. She graciously made her house and garden available for Bedford Garden Club functions. #### Mary Welsh McLeran Parker

Mrs. Morgan Parker (Polly) died on October 22nd, 2001 at the age of 109 at her home 'Bylane' in Katonah. A member of the Bedford Garden Club for sixty-two years, she was an expert in every aspect of gardening and generous in sharing her knowledge. Her passion was nature conservation, and she was a pioneer in the years when conservation began focusing on national and local issues. She held many positions in the club, including chairing the club's Civic Affairs and Conservation Committee from 1944-1946, and again in 1953. She received numerous club awards for her generosity of time and spirit.

Polly Parker held her garden open for many garden tours, was known to train many young gardeners who often went on to help others in the community. How else would so many have learned how to shake the earth off a weed before throwing the weed away? Not only were her enthusiasm, accomplishments and love of nature an inspiration to all, but so was her humor!

When garden club members dressed as vegetables at a Harvest festival, Polly was an onion! And then there was her fascination with mushrooms and herbs that led her to explore many potential edibles and remedies; somehow she and her husband managed to avoid the harmful ones!

Her true commitment to conservation was witnessed by two wonderful gifts to the James Ramsay Hunt Sanctuary of the Bedford Audubon Society. In September of 1990, she deeded ten acres and, in May of 1996, her home 'Bylane' and 120 acres. These are a fitting and magnificent legacy to a woman who truly enjoyed sharing her surroundings and talents with others, and who was a beloved and outstanding member of the Bedford Garden Club. Happily her tradition is carried on, as her daughter-in-taw, Helen Parker, is a current Associate member and past president of the club.

#### Grace deCemea Reiniger

Grace Reiniger, who lived in Bedford, N. Y. for fifty-five years died on April 6, 2002. She was the devoted and loved wife of Scott Hale Reiniger with whom she served during WW II as a Red Cross Nurse's aide. A mother of four, grandmother of five and great-grandmother of three, Grace dedicated her volunteer energies toward work with persons with physical and mental illness.

Mrs. Reiniger had a strong love of nature and this influenced her for many years as a member of the Bedford Garden Club. She established magnificent English Gardens at her home and made these available whenever hospitality or sanctuary was needed. One of Mrs. Reiniger's favorite places was Longwood Gardens where she stopped often to wander and take inspiration.

It is of note that Mrs. Reiniger was a descendant of First Lieutenant Francois duPuy, a French Huguenot who settled in New Amsterdam in 1635. Her ancestors bought land from the Indians and remained for ten generations in the State of New York helping to develop commerce on the Hudson River.

## BY-LAWS OF THE BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB, INC.

#### 1988

The BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB wrote its first By-laws in 1911. It is one of the twelve Founder Clubs which in 1913 founded The Garden Club of America.

Article I

Name

This Association shall be known as the BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB, INC.

Article II

Object

The object of the Club shall be to stimulate knowledge and love of gardening among amateurs, to aid in the protection of native plants and birds, and to encourage civic planting and conservation.

#### Article III

#### Directors

- 1. The control and conduct of the property and business of the Club shall be vested in a Board of Directors comprised of six members. All directors shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the members of the Club present, or by proxy, at the Annual Meeting of members, including any adjournment thereof, except that vacancies occurring during the year may be temporarily filled by the Board until the next Annual Meeting of members.
- 2. Meetings. The Board of Directors shall meet annually immediately following the Annual Meeting of Members and shall elect officers.\* The Board of Directors shall meet at such other dates throughout the year as it may determine.

<sup>\*</sup> Incorporation requires a Board of Directors. The membership elects the directors, who then elect the officers. However, the Nominating Committee, in proposing candidates for the Board, will recommend those whom they propose for specific office (to be shown in parentheses on the slate). It can be assumed that the recommendations of the membership will be followed by the Board.

The Board of Directors will consult with and work with the Executive Committee as described in our By-laws.

3. Quorum of Board of Directors. Fifty percent of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business in any meeting of the directors.

#### Officers

The officers of the Club shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected by the Board of Directors to serve two years or until their successors are elected. Three officers, the President, First Vice-President, and Corresponding Secretary, shall be elected on the odd year; the Second Vice-President, the Recording Secretary, and the Treasurer on the even year. No President shall hold office for more than four years in succession.

#### Article IV

#### President

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club, and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, shall appoint the Chairmen of all Committees, shall arrange for the orientation of new members, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by action of the Club or the Executive Committee, and as pertain to the Office of President, including acting as a legal Trustee of all Club finances. The Vice-President, or in her absence the Second Vice-President, shall have all the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President in case of her absence or disability.

#### Article V

#### Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be custodian of all funds, shall disburse all money, shall collect all dues and receive donations and income from special projects. She shall also act as a legal Trustee of all Club finances. She shall present a report at all Regular Meetings, and a duly audited Annual Report at the Annual Meeting.

#### Article VI

#### Secretaries

The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, shall conduct the correspondence of the Club and notify the Garden Club of America of any changes in membership.

The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings, and act as a legal Trustee of all Club finances.

#### Article VII

#### **Executive Committee**

- 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the six officers of the Club (the Board of Directors), the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, four members from the Club at large, and upon invitation of the Executive Committee, the Chairmen of Special Committees. In the absence of the Chairman of a Standing Committee or a Special Committee, the Committee's Vice-Chairman shall serve. Subject to these By-laws and to any action taken by the members of the Club at any Annual or Special Meeting, the affairs and business of the Club, the electing of its members and the disbursement of its funds shall be in charge of this Committee.
- 2. The four members from the Club at large shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to serve for one year only, or until their successors are elected.
- 3. During the year, there must be a minimum of eight monthly meetings of the Executive Committee, and five days' written notice shall be given to each member. Seven of its members shall constitute a quorum. Special Meetings may be called by the President or any five members of the Committee.
- 4. The Executive Committee or the President shall submit at each regular meeting of the Club a short report of the affairs of the Club, or such report as the Club may direct.
- 5. The Board of Directors shall have power, in case of a vacancy in any office provided for under Article III or in the elected membership of the Executive Committee, to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.
- 6. Any member who has special business she may wish to present to the Executive Committee, is privileged to bring it before a meeting of the Executive Committee, after having notified the Corresponding Secretary of her intention.
- 7. The Executive Committee shall have power to deal with all infringements of the rules of the Club.
- 8. (a) An officer of the Club who shall be absent for three successive meetings without providing a report or explanation satisfactory to the Executive Committee shall be deemed to have resigned.

- (b) If a Standing Committee is not represented at three successive meetings by a Chairman or Vice-Chairman or by a report of the Committee presented by the Secretary, the Chairman of such Committee shall have deemed to have resigned.
- (c) A member at large must present an explanation satisfactory to the Executive Committee for her absence from three successive meetings.
- 9. Order of business for the Executive Committee shall be as follows:
  - Minutes of the Committee.
  - Treasurer's Report.
  - Reports of both Secretaries.
  - Reports of Standing Committees.
  - Election of new members.
  - Reports of Special Committees.
  - Unfinished business.
  - New business.

#### Article VIII

#### Nominating Committee

- 1. This Committee shall consist of five members. The Chairman shall be appointed in October by the President in consultation with the Executive Committee. Two members shall be appointed from the Executive Committee and three from the Club at large. The Chairman will become a member of the Executive Committee. She and her committee will serve for that calendar year.
- 2. The Committee shall nominate a ticket of candidates for the Board of Directors and four members at large and shall notify the Corresponding Secretary, who shall mail a list of candidates so nominated to each member of the Club at least ten days before the Annual Meeting. This committee may also assist the President or President-elect in appointments of all Standing and Special Committees.

#### Article IX

#### Custodian

There will be a Custodian, appointed by the President, whose duties it shall e to have the care and custody of all files, records and archives and all other properties of the Club (except funds and securities) when turned over to her by the Officers and Chairmen of Committees.

#### Article X

### **Standing Committees**

The Chairman of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President as soon as may be after the Annual Meeting and announced at the next regular meeting of the members. The members of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of such Committee after consultation with the President.

There shall be the following Standing Committees:

- 1. Program It shall be the duty of this Committee to arrange programs for all meetings covering and consistent with the work and interests of the Standing Committees, and other interests and projects of the Club, to arrange dates and places of meetings subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, and to prepare notices of meetings for the Corresponding Secretary three weeks in advance.
- 2. Membership It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive the names of candidates for membership, to pass on the eligibility of the candidates and to present their names to the Executive Committee, and to inform the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of any changes in membership.
- 3. Exhibitions (Known as Flower Show by GCA). It shall be the duty of this Committee to be responsible for flower arranging and for providing workshops for the members. There shall be at least one exhibition each year.
- 4. Conservation and Civic Affairs It shall be the duty of this Committee to encourage the wise use and sound management of our natural resources both locally and nationally; to encourage the setting aside and maintenance of natural areas; and to stimulate an interest in conservation in the community. It shall also be the duty of this Committee to have a representative present at meetings of the Town Board, the Planning Board, and the Zoning Board of Appeals, when the subject of its meeting is relative to the interests and objectives of the Club. It should acquaint itself with the local zoning ordinances, and keep the Club informed of pertinent pending changes or variances, promote interest in community betterment by such projects as roadside and other civic planting, control of litter, elimination of billboards, etc., and work to preserve the integrity, stability and beauty of this area.
- 5. Horticulture It shall be the duty of this Committee to stimulate the knowledge and love of horticulture among the members; to institute courses in horticulture for members, and to cooperate with local horticulture programs.

#### Article XI

#### <u>Meetings</u>

1. Annual Meeting – The Club shall hold on Annual Meeting of the members for the election of Directors and the four members of the Executive Committee from the Club at large and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. This meeting shall be held in June at such date, hour and place as may be designated by the Board of Directors. Order of business for the Annual Meeting shall be as follows:

Minutes of last Annual Meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

Reports of both secretaries.

Reports of Standing Committees.

Reports of such special Committees as may be designated by the President.

Unfinished business.

President's Report.

Report of the Nominating Committee.

Election of Board of Directors and Members at Large.

Nominations from the floor may precede the elections and a plurality of votes shall elect.

New business.

2. Regular Meetings – A minimum of seven Regular Meetings shall be held each year. The places and the dates proposed by the Program Committee shall be approved by the Executive Committee.

Order of Business for Regular Meetings shall be as follows:

Minutes of last meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

Any reports at the direction of the President.

- 3. At least ten days' notice in writing shall be given each member of all meetings except Special Meetings.
- 4. Special Meetings Special Meetings may be called by the President or at the written request of any five members, sent to the Corresponding Secretary, stating the object for which such meeting is called. The Corresponding Secretary shall notify all members in writing of the date and object of such meeting, giving not

less than three days' notice, and no other business than that stated in the notice shall be transacted at a Special Meeting.

- 5. Twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Club.
- 6. Members who shall fail to attend the meetings of the Club for three consecutive meetings without satisfactory explanation in writing to the Corresponding Secretary may be dropped from membership in the Club except as provided under Article VII, Section 7.

#### Article XII

#### Members

- 1. Admission to membership in the Club shall be limited to those owning property and residing in Northern Westchester County, or renting in this area for a minimum of two years, and exhibiting a strong interest in horticulture, flower arranging, or conservation and civic affairs.
- 2. The total membership excluding Honorary, Privileged and Affiliate Members shall not exceed our quota of 125 members of which the total of Associate Members shall not exceed 25 and the combined total of Active and Sustaining Members shall not exceed 100.
- 3. There shall be six classes of membership:
  - a. Honorary Members. Persons of Distinction who have rendered outstanding service to the Club over a period of years and so are eligible for this high honor.
  - b. Active Members. This category constitutes the working members of the Club. They shall attend meetings regularly, serve on committees, and take part in the projects of the Club.
  - c. Associate Members. Associate Members shall have full privileges of the Club, including the power of voting. Their attendance at the Regular Meetings and participation in any active work of the Club is optional. Associate Members shall not exceed 25 in number and shall be limited to those who have been Active Members of the Club for at least 10 years and have served with distinction.
  - d. Sustaining Members. Members who have completed ten years of satisfactory service and who are no longer desirous or able to participate in our Club's activities, are eligible for this membership at the discretion of the Executive Committee. These members shall have the privilege of attending Garden Club of America lectures, open teas, obtaining Visiting Garden information and will receive the Bulletin. They may attend meetings of the Bedford Garden Club but may not vote, chair any of the five Standing Committees, or hold office.
  - e. Affiliate Members. Affiliate Membership may be granted at the discretion of her Club's Board to any member in good standing who has moved to another area or who is no longer active because of a compelling reason.

- 1. An Affiliate member may not represent her Club as a delegate of a Zone or Annual Meeting.
- 2. The Bedford Garden Club Affiliate Member is an active member of The Garden Club of America. She may attend lectures, enjoy the use of the Headquarters, have Visiting Garden privileges and receive the Garden Club of America Bulletin. She may attend all Bedford Garden Club functions but may not vote, chair any committee or hold office.
- f. Privileged Membership shall be granted to any person, male or female, who has been helpful to and shown interest in the Bedford Garden Club, but is not eligible for regular membership. This membership shall not exceed seven in number at any one time. These members shall be proposed to the Membership Committee in the usual way and acted upon in conjunction with the Executive Committee. They may participate in Club activities and attend meetings, but they shall not hold office or be eligible to vote. They shall not be considered members of the Garden Club of America and shall not pay dues.

#### Article XIII

#### New Members

- 1. The first step in proposing a new member is to contact the Membership Committee Chairman who will explain the procedure.
- 2. A candidate of membership shall be proposed and seconded in writing by members of the Club. The letters of the proposer and seconder together with three letters from members by whom the candidate is well known shall be sent to the Chairman of the Membership Committee. The six officers and those on the Membership Committee may not write these recommendations.
- 3. A member may propose only one and second only one candidate for membership and may write only three endorsing letters during a Club year. A member may not write for a relative for membership in the Club. A member may not propose, second or endorse names for membership until she herself has been a member for one year.
- 4. Candidates shall be considered by the Membership Committee in the order of the submission of their names together with the letters of their proposers, seconders and three endorsing letters as above provided, and no candidate shall be considered until all the requirements of this By-law shall have been complied with.

- 5. Former members and children of former or present members whose names are proposed for membership shall be considered prior to other candidates. Former members who desire to be reinstated need only be proposed and seconded in writing by members. The six Officers and those on the Membership Committee may not write these recommendations. Reinstated members shall have the original date of membership, resignation and reentry listed in the Yearbook.
- 6. Candidates duly proposed and presented as provided for above shall be voted on by the Executive Committee for admission to the Club. Voting shall be by secret ballot. Two adverse votes shall exclude.
- 7. Active Members are expected to serve on one of the following committees: Horticulture, Exhibitions, or Conservation and Civic Affairs unless excused by the Executive Committee for extenuating circumstances.
- 8. In conformity with the Garden Club of America policy regarding dual membership, incoming members of the Bedford Garden Club shall not hold membership in two Garden Club of America's Clubs situated in one locality.

#### Article XIV

## Resignation

Resignation from membership shall be made to the Membership Chairman in writing.

#### Article XV

#### Annual Dues

Dues are subject to change at the discretion of the Executive Committee and the Garden Club of America.

All dues include the dues of the Garden Club of America. All members who shall have failed to pay these dues within a month of the second notice shall cease to be members of the Club, except as provided under Article VII, Section 7.

#### Article XVI

#### Guests

Members may bring their house guests to any meeting of the Club except Annual or Special Meetings. Persons living in the neighborhood who are not members of the Bedford Garden Club are not entitled to attend meetings except with the approval of the Membership Chairman and the President. The Hostess should be consulted when a meeting is held in a member's house.

#### Article XVII

#### Amendments

These By-laws may be amended at an Annual or Special Meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting. No amendment shall be considered unless the Corresponding Secretary shall have mailed a copy thereof to each member of the Club at least ten days before the meeting.

#### Article XVIII

### **Disposition of Funds**

No part of the assets of the Club shall inure to the benefit of any member of the Club. In the event of the dissolution of the Club, all remaining funds shall be turned over to the Garden Club of America.

#### Article XIX

### **Policy**

Any service rendered to the Club by a member should be provided at cost with no profit to that member.

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSTESSES

- (1) It is the responsibility of the Chairman of Hostesses to appoint a Head Hostess and four co-hostesses for each Garden Club meeting, in addition to the member in whose house the meeting is held.
  - (a) In the event that the appointed Head Hostess cannot fulfill her responsibilities, she is expected to get a replacement and report the change to the Chairman of Hostesses at least two months before her assigned meeting.
  - (b) The Head Hostess and her co-hostesses make and work out all details and arrangements involving hospitality for the meeting and tea.
  - (c) The Head Hostess should confer first with the member in whose house the meeting is being held to ascertain what will be needed in the way of chairs, coat racks, flowers, food, china, silver, direction signs, parking attendant and table for the President.
  - (d) The Head Hostess then makes arrangements with her co-hostesses to work out details and decide what will be provided for refreshments. She contacts the Treasurer for money from the Hostess Fund, which is provided through the dues, as an assessment of \$5 per member.
  - (e) The Head Hostess should contact the Corresponding Secretary a few days before the meeting to find out how many acceptances have been received. She should not purchase any plastic cups, napkins, plates, etc., until our supply is exhausted. The Custodian is in charge of these items as well as the large coffee and hot water (for tea) pots, which are needed upon occasions.
- (2) Co-hostesses may be asked to come the morning of the meeting to help set up chairs or to stay after the meeting to help the hostess put her house back in order.
  - (a) If a co-hostess is unable to fulfill her responsibilities, she is to get a substitute and report the change to her Head Hostess at least two months before her assigned meeting.
- (3) Flower arrangements are the responsibility of the hostesses. If the help of the Flower Arranging Committee is desired, it should be requested in plenty of time.
- (4) All members are asked to turn to be hostesses and it is hoped that all meeting and tea arrangements will be kept as simple as possible.
- (5) During their term of office, the President, two Secretaries, Treasurer and Chairmen of Civic Affairs and Conservation, Flower Arranging, Horticulture and Programs will be excluded from being asked to be hostesses.
