National Parks, Natural Treasures
Denver, Colorado
May 20-24, 2006

Zone XII hosted the 93rd Garden Club of America Annual Meeting in Denver Colorado. This zone consists of seventeen clubs in Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, New Mexico, Oregon, and Washington. All of these states have at least one National park, thus providing the theme: National Parks - Natural Treasures. It proved to be a perfect title, as Virginia Maybank and I had a constant view of the Rocky Mountains throughout our stay in Denver. The Rockies were a beautiful backdrop to our Zone Dinner at the Denver Center for the Performing Arts, and again during Cocktails the following night at the Denver Museum of Nature and Science. The exhibits and architecture were interesting at

both venues, as were the many Garden Club Presidents and Delegates that we met. Our stay in Denver was a great mix of work and play starting with the delivery of our plants to the Plant Exchange. Thanks to Gilda McGarry and Virginia Maybank for providing wonderful entries that were well received and quickly snapped up. This was the last plant exchange to be held at an Annual Meeting. It will still take place on the zone level.

The annual meeting officially kicked off with the President and Delegate Workshops. While Virginia attended the President's Workshop on Leadership, I attended the Delegate's Workshop. At the workshop we addressed such questions as: "How can we use the GCA to convey the importance of the organization to club members?" It was very informative and eye opening.

President Alice Matthews called the business meeting to order Monday morning. We received a warm welcome from the Mayor of Denver and our gracious Annual Meeting Chairs. We heard reports from all of the committees. The keynote speaker was Mr. Panayoti Kelaidis, a Member at Large and Director of Outreach at the Denver Botanic Garden. He spoke about his Plant Select Program that has introduced hundreds of ornamental plants. We were also introduced to 3 new Members at Large: Mr. John Wheaton Trexler, Mr. George Hawkins, and Mr. George Briggs. The Founders Fund Award was given to the Native Plant Woodland at the Garden School Project in Los Angeles, California.

When the meeting was adjourned, the group split into two, half went on a walking tour of the South Platte River Greenway System, with the other half going to The Denver Botanic Garden. My group did the walking tour following a delicious lunch at the Pepsi Arena where the Colorado Avalanche and the Denver Nuggets play hockey and basketball. Our guest speaker was Bar Chadwick of the Mayor's office of Economic Development. She showed slides and spoke about reclaiming the river and parks, which were once a dumping ground. As we walked along the river, we heard from various people who were instrumental in turning this area into a wonderful place to boat, picnic, fish, and bike.

Tuesday morning the Conservation and Horticulture Meetings took place. Our first Conservation Speaker was Judy Sellers from the Broadmoor Garden Club (one of our host clubs). Her talk was entitled "This Land Is Your Land, This Land is My Land". Judy is the author of a beautiful book, *Colorado Wild, Preserving the Spirit*. She spoke of our discovery of the Rockies, man's consumption of the natural resources and the difference individuals can make in conservation. She stressed our role as caretakers of the land for future generations. We also heard from Tom Kiernan, President of the National Parks and Conservation Center, who said that the National parks are only receiving 2/3 of the money they need to do their jobs. There have been many cuts affecting law enforcement, park rangers, staffing and programs, as well as monitoring of air quality control. Our speaker for Horticulture was Gwen Kelaidis, who is a landscape designer and author. She spoke about "The High and the Dry" conditions and appropriate grading and plants for the Denver area.

After the meeting was adjourned, we split up again and went on the tour we missed the day before. I went off to the Denver Botanic Gardens while Virginia went off on the walking

tour. After lunch at the Botanic Gardens, we were able to meander around the beautiful grounds taking in 45 beautifully designed gardens with over 32,000 plants. The Rock Alpine, and water-smart gardens were especially interesting as they work with the native plants that thrive in "the high and dry" climate that Gwen Kelaidis had mentioned. STANDING COMMITTEES

<u>CIVIC AFFAIRS AND CONSERVATION</u> 2006-2007

The Conservation Committee continues to encourage our members to participate in civic activities, in land preservation, and in environmental education. A primary task has been attending and reporting on the Town of Bedford's many committees with oversight of land use: Planning, Zoning and Wetlands, as well as the Town Board. Attendance has yielded a heightened awareness of development pressures in town and of government and private initiatives which address or exacerbate land use trends. We are now very aware of the remedial action we may take as homeowners and citizens.

Following on news of town-wide activities, discussions ensued on land preservation topics. Especially helpful were interviews with the people who make use of conservation easements. Our report addressed what easements are, who initiates them and crafts them, how reliable they are as legal devices, and their prospect for each of us as landowners or as members of the Bedford community where many parcels of land are now being eased, with easements being maintained into the future by the Westchester Land Trust.

Other successful committee work has been the clean up of our section of Route 22 with much trash collected and properly discarded. We thank all who helped in keeping Bedford's main road handsome and neat. We have continued, as a club, to weed, plant and water gardens and tubs around town, enhancing the quality of life for everyone. And we gave a power point report, based on last year's conservation exhibit in the flower show on the topic of drinking water, to the Bedford Village Library. Arriving in time for the start of the school year, the information on our water supply was available for every library visitor, a very effective educational tool for which we thank the flower show committee

Adopt-a-Road 2005-2007

In 1992 the BGC signed an agreement with the State of New York to adopt the state highway - Route 22 between Route 172 and The Hook Road. Town Meetings

2006 - 2007

This year saw follow-up from last year's concentration on water. The theme was a constant in planning and zoning meetings, and on members' minds. Rather than just report on meetings and hearings, since we felt the big themes had all been identified, we tried instead to offer some tentative answers to the biggest questions. Of course, those just led to more and more questions.

Water testing: what is the first thing you do if you find a contaminant in your well? Test it again. It's very possible that the fault was in the test, not the water – and then you can get to the questions of how to remediate; how to filter; how to find clean water; how to notify your neighbors and potential purchasers. What is the town doing about its expensive stormwater-management obligations under the Clean Water Act? Banding together with the 11 other towns in the Croton Watershed as part of the Northern Westchester Watershed Committee, for a regional solution. Are the members of the coalition similar enough to be interested in a shared solution, other than in being overwhelmed by the new obligations?

What is an easement, really? Who holds all these easements that are being created, and will they manage them responsibly? This is a new area, of public interest (open space) being created by an owner and a town, and then held by a third party, a non-governmental body (the Land Trust, for example, or Nature Conservancy). While we applaud our permitting boards for their sincere attempts to be flexible and accommodating to owners, we'll want them to be realistic about the future staffing and enforcement need they're building up. Who is going to keep track of these interests, and for how long? Who is going to pay to enforce them when memories fade and circumstances change?

What about organics as an alternative to chemical herbicides and pesticides: Are there any jurisdictions that really use them systematically and with a full commitment? Are they effective? How expensive are they? Maybe we can learn from Canada's experiment, or Fairfield County's. Maybe we can produce our own. I know, I know – I said we offered tentative answers, and all I've given here are more questions. Sorry! Thanks to all the brilliant and committed members of the Bedford Garden Club who helped work through these most important issues. Lots more work for next year.

Town Meetings

2005 - 2006

This year saw the full range of planning and zoning issues, on ratios, setbacks, variances, permits....Themes: how to balance competing needs, and how to be flexible without being a patsy. Sometimes solutions exist that make everyone happy – plantings can protect a vernal pond against a driveway; a schedule for dredging can protect those little spring-breeding frogs. Sometimes the board needed to be extra prescriptive, where owners have broken past promises (meadow maintenance). Sometimes the board takes on a big obligation for continuing oversight and enforcement (a rain garden in the woods at the bottom of a steep slope. Really??)

Sometimes the Board relies on whistle-blowers: we were given detailed instructions on how anonymously to rat out a neighbor who appears to be violating an ordinance – even presented in a way that made it feel helpful! And sometimes a board just has to punt: what about underground wiring in the historic district, and the damage to old trees from all that trenching? Don't decide yet – hold more hearings.

The members of the Bedford Garden Club are to be commended for their thoughtful and conscientious attendance at planning and zoning meetings this year! This was also the year of Water: the proposal to expand the wetlands buffer, the symposium at St. Matthew's, the Flower Show exhibit, and the town's continuing struggles (political, financial, mechanical) with drinking and waste in their water districts. Our conclusions, respectively? Defeated; interesting but inconclusive; powerful; and frustrating. Not to mention the beginning sounds of legal steps to cut back the scope of the Clean Water Act. Even if these issues were resolved locally this year, they're not solved. For how long will we be able to drink our own groundwater? What will be the technologies we'll need to depend on when we can't? How much will it cost?

What were our most important lessons from the Flower Show exhibit? First, and most important, we've got some smart, hard-working, talented and artistic members! Second, when it comes to testing your well water, you only find what you look for. And finally, this is a big issue: let's save all we've learned so we can build on it.

National Affairs & Legislation

GCA Legislative Update 2006-2007

Given the power shift in the House and the Senate, the environmental legislative agenda was more helpful and active than in recent years. Here are a few highlights:

Global Warming

After years of emphasizing the need for energy independence and more energy, never mind the impact on global warming, Congress is now reflecting a new enthusiasm for "doing something" about emissions of carbon and other greenhouse gases (GHGs). With leadership backing, the 110th Congress has launched a spate of initiatives which now are making their way through the legislative maze. These initiatives are:

- Senate ENR energy efficiency bill, S.1115 addresses standards and funding for renewable fuels, biofuels and large scale sequestration of carbon emissions.
- Senate EPW biofuels bill, S.1297 similar attempt to address standards for renewable fuels, establishing a green fuels labeling program and promotion of the most suitable lands for clean fuels development.
- CAFÉ Standards (Corporate Average Fuel Efficiency) the Senate Commerce Committee reported a bill that would require the Dept. of Transportation to raise CAFÉ standards to an average of 35 mpg by 2020 for cars and light trucks

- with 4% improvement each year after.
- Carbon Emission Caps in April, the Supreme Court ruled 5 to 4 that the EPA has the authority under the Clean Air Act to limit carbon emissions. The ruling, however, neither forced EPA to limit emissions nor specified how such emissions limits must be structured.
- Senate Resolution, S.Res.30 promotes U.S. participation in the international negotiations that are already under way to establish how the world should proceed sfter the current agreement expires in 2012. The U.S. is not participating in the current agreement and thus does not have a seat at the table where follow-on binding arrangements are being discussed.

Water

WRDA (Water Resources Development Act) Authorization – HR 1495 – a fast track, pork laden bill was introduced in March that would weaken the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) provisions for Corps of Engineers projects. Critical wetland loss is of concern as well as diversion of scarce surface water for agricultural use and for continuing commercial and residential development.

Oceans

HR 21 – is a comprehensive oceans reform bill sponsored by members of the House Oceans Caucus. It was first introduced in the 108th Congress and has gone through several iterations. The current version, which has 29 cosponsors from both parties, draws heavily from reports issued by the U.S. Commission on Ocean Policy, the Pew Oceans Commission, and the Joint Ocean Commission Initiative. It fills in missing pieces in the current law governing our policies regarding protection of ocean ecosystems. Among its provisions are the following:

- o It would establish a National Oceans Advisor to the president, a White House Committee on Oceans Policy, and a Council of Oceans Policy Advisors.
- O It would require the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) administrator to set up a network of regional ocean ecosystem resource information systems for each ocean region and other bodies of water.
- o It would designate certain ocean regions for ecosystem-based management and would establish a Regional Ocean Partnership for each region.
- It would establish a \$1.32 billion Ocean and Great Lakes Conservation Trust Fund, financed partly by a "healthy oceans" postage stamp. The fund would make payments to coastal states for development and implementation of regional ocean strategy plans.
- O It would create an "organic law" for NOAA to bring together all of NOAA's various authorities and responsibilities in a single coordinated statute. Right now NOAA's authorities are found in a hodge-podge of various riders, acts, amendments and executive orders passed at different times.

The Butler-Meyer Preserve of the Eastern New York Chapter of the Nature Conservancy 2005 and 2007

This is a busy and rewarding time for the Butler and Meyer Preserves which has taken on a new and exciting direction. The chapter hosted a "Books At Butler" series of highly successful author events. These gatherings allowed Conservancy members and guests access to well-known authors and inspired discussions on front-page issues facing the community at large. These events held at Butler and other venues across Westchester have been the catalyst for lively conversations on the natural and social history of the Hudson River Valley, global climate change, the challenges of creating wildlife corridors to protect threatened species and even oysters!

Authors highlighted this past year included the following: Mark Kurlansky, *The Big Oyster: History on the Half Shell*, Elizabeth Kolbert, *Field Notes from a Catastrophe -- Man, Nature and Climate Change*, Jonathan Adams, *The Future of the Wild*. Tom Lewis, *The Hudson: A History*" Amy Stewart, *Flower Confidential - The Good, the Bad and the*

Beautiful in the Business of Flowers, and Patricia Schultz, author of 1,000 Places to See Before You Die.

Numerous volunteer days were held at the preserves for "spiffing-up" our beautiful surroundings. Butler Sanctuary is no stranger to invasive plants, so one of the tasks assigned to volunteers was to remove these invasives by hand pulling garlic mustard, cutting back Japanese barberry and severing Asiatic bittersweet vines.

In 2006, the Butler Sanctuary was opened to pets on a trial basis and led several dog walks in a effort to combine recreation with an appreciation for a pristine natural habitat. I am told these events were well received, especially the bones! Also, a Vistors' Survey was created for feedback on our preserves.

Litigation continues with Seven Springs LLC to oppose any attempt to re-open an abandoned road that runs through the Meyer Preserve.

Finally, many exciting programs are planned for next year including the "Books At Butler" series. Plan to take advantage of the wonderful programs offered at our preserves or plan a visit to enjoy our special corner of the world!

<u>HORTICULTURE</u> 2006-2007

This year turned out to be a "getting ready for a major flower show" tutorial. Specifically we used the program for the upcoming March 2007 Greenfingers Garden Club schedule as our focus.

In October a group of about fifteen members met in my garage and discussed strategies for forcing bulbs. Available to all were the bulbs asked for in the Greenfingers schedule: specific varieties of narcissus, tulip, and hyacinth. We chose different mixtures of potting material, added fertilizer or not, gave spacious or crammed treatment and went home to put our experiments in various cold weather locations for personal choices of allotted time. More about this to follow!

In January we met again in the (envy of all gardeners) exquisite greenhouse of member Linda Wilson where ten or so members talked about planting seeds in winter. We were particularly interested in nasturtiums to fulfill another horticulture class in the Greenfingers schedule. We discussed various advantages and risks of heat, grow lights, transplanting, hardening off etc. We also potted up the amaryllis requested for a bulb forcing class.

Some of us began to pull our winterized bulbs out during January to force into bloom for the big day in March! From the reports I received, one member's bulbs were so successful that by the March show her blooms had already come and gone; some just chose to enjoy theirs at home and the few of us who brought our beauties to the show were very pleased but none were winners.

In May our president Virginia Maybank arranged a workshop at The Greenwich Garden Center for members to learn and practice propagation of plants by leaf cuttings. In preparation for The Zone III Garden Club of America horticulture entry, we were particularly interested in begonia cuttings, but also used African violets and Streptocarpus. Several of our members were able to successfully send their sprouted cuttings to the Zone III Flower Show in Southampton.

Congratulations to Dominique Barron who won 1st Prize for her "Clivia" in our In-House Flower Show and also 1st Prize and Best in Show for her cut branch deutzia and Honorable Mention for her cutting of climbing rose "American Pillar" in the Zone III Flower Show.

HORTICULTURE 2005-2006

This year I decided to concentrate on basic gardening knowledge that some of us have overlooked or may not really have the latest advice. I wanted to make the concept of gardening more a communal enterprise by getting together and sharing stories and tips on things that have worked for other Club member's growing adventures.

November 2nd, 2005 was our first meeting at my house. I had done a little research in Gardening Books and at the Cornell Cooperative Center in Valhalla about soil in our area. I had handouts describing what soil could possibly be composed of and what the optimum soil would be for different garden plants and trees. We discussed different commercial soil testing kits, gadgets and 'send away' analysis sites. Ultimately, we each tested soil from an area or two from our own gardens by putting a soil sample in a tall thin jar, adding a bit of detergent and filling with water. After thorough shaking and prolonged settling we could observe the rough percentages of sand, clay and loam as it settled in visible layers. We discussed the possible steps we could take to improve the loam content of our soils as that seemed to be needed by everyone. Next we tested our soils for Ph and again discussed the merits of slightly acidic soils which are prevalent in our area. Also we looked at what would be needed to raise the Ph of soils to allow for a

different flora. We discussed lots of products on the market and concluded that everybody likes lots of Hollytone and Sweet Peat and earthworms.

Our next meeting was in January and it was incumbent on us to study the process of starting seeds indoors in preparation for the June flower show "Under A Tuscan Sun". The seed had been obtained as was required from The Seed Savers Exchange, an organic collection of heirloom seeds harvested and protected by standardized practices. We looked at many different trays and pots, clay, plastic and pressed peat, potting soils and additives, covers, identifying labels, heat, lighting and timing. Everyone planted seeds or took them home to plant. Each of us chose slightly different growing conditions, and we had good fun comparing notes as our 'babies' emerged. Linda Wilson and I both tucked our favorite combination of grown seedlings-plants into containers to exhibit in the Insalata Mista Class at our flower show.

On February 8th a trip was organized to the NYC Flower Market for the purpose of purchasing topiaries to possibly exhibit in the Le Statue Verdi Class at the June flower show. Members also volunteered to put miniature Italian Gardens together for a Class called 'Un Piccolo Giardino'.

At the Planting Day meeting in May, members brought cut stems of flowers to The John Jay Homestead Barn for an entertaining and invaluable discussion of what judges are looking for in the upcoming Tutti I Fiori Class.'

Finally the day we had all been training for: June 1 and all assembled, arranged and awaited the judges' decisions. The evening party was a drenching success and many members and their progeny won hard earned ribbons. Everybody produced expert displays and learned a lot more about each other and the secrets of successful gardening.

At this time members of the BGC are trying to grow seeds and care for plants distributed to all Zone III clubs for exhibit at the Zone III meeting to be held September 26-28 hosted by The Essex County Garden Club.

AWARDS 2006-2007

At the Zone III meeting and flower show held in Southampton, NY, where all 22 clubs in the zone were represented, two exciting awards were given to two of our members, one a GCA award and the other a Zone III award.

The Dorothy Vietor Munger Award may be awarded to members of Garden Club of America clubs only in competitive flower arranging classes at a Small Flower Show. It is offered in recognition of creative work of outstanding beauty using predominantly fresh plant material. The arrangement must have placed 1st, 2nd or 3rd. Challenge classes are not eligible for this award. The award is not a substitute for Best in Show and will be given at the discretion of the judges.

The recipient's entry represented the Bedford Garden Club. She competed against 21 other garden clubs. This year the Dorothy Vietor award was given to Dominique Buaron by the GCA flower show committee for her arrangement in the Zone III flower show "for her creativity with fresh flowers."

The Zone III Horticulture Arts award, in honor of Elizabeth Platt Corning is awarded to Zone III GCA clubs or members as well as other organizations and individuals for special achievement in the field of Horticulture Arts which may include literature, the fine arts or education. The interpretation of this award is to be broad in scope and imaginative.

The recipient teaches botanical art and illustration at the NY Botanical Garden. She has done so for 20 years. Her work has been exhibited in over 200 shows throughout the US. She shares her talents willingly in an understated way. She designed and painted the certificate for this award for the GCA. POLICY 2006-2007 Garden History and Design Committee

From 1920-1935 GCA had over 2000 glass slides of gardens. GCA Members continued to record Gardens photographically, and these results were handed over to the Smithsonian Institution's Archives of American Gardens. In 1992 the GCA Collection officially became part of the Horticulture Services of the Smithsonian Archives of American Gardens. In 1996 Garden History and Design became an official Standing Committee for the Garden Club of America. The Bedford Garden Club is one of the few GCA clubs that does not have a Standing Committee for Garden History and Design. Now seems and opportune time for our Club to add this Standing Committee.

Purpose of the Garden History and Design Committee.

- To Educate GCA members about trends in contemporary landscape and garden design.
- To interact with committees of The Garden Club of America about garden design and garden history through: Visiting Gardens, Workshops, Programs, and Conservation
- To add to the GCA Collection at the Archives of American Gardens through photography and other media.

Therefore it is proposed that the By-Laws of the Bedford Garden Club be amended as follows:

A new Section 6 shall be added to article X to read as follows:

6. Garden History and Design - it shall be the duty of this Committee to educate the Members about American landscape and garden design, to demonstrate how American Garden history is and has always been an integral part of the cultural and social life of the communities in which these gardens exist, and to continue to add to the GCA Collection at the Archives of American Gardens by researching, documenting and photographing important American gardens, past and present, large and small, simple or complex, classical or vernacular.

Section I of Article XII shall be amended to read as follows:

1. Admissions to membership in the club shall be limited to those owning property and residing in Northern Westchester County or renting in this area for a minimum of two years, and exhibiting a strong interest in horticulture, flower arranging, conservation and civic affairs or garden history and design.

Section 7 of Article XIII shall be amended to read as follows:

7. Active Members are expected to serve on a least one of the following Committees: Horticulture, Exhibitions, Conservation and Civic Affairs, or Garden History and Design unless excused by the Executive Committee or extenuating circumstances.

PROJECT REVIEW COMMITTEE

First Vice President's Report 2006-07

A master calendar was prepared in the early fall and updated continually through the year to keep track of the Bedford Garden Club's happenings as well as other major events which might influence garden club planning.

In terms of Project Review, it was a busy year. Several projects were considered and many were approved. A research assistant program at the Mianus River Gorge Preserve was approved. A \$7,000.00 contribution was made to pay for the RA salary/stipend. We gave a donation of \$1,500.00 to Bedford Hill Correctional Institute's Children Garden to pay for some trees and other plantings. The Community Center received two teak benches for placement outside the center for people waiting for transportation. Two local schools received money for garden related improvements. The Bedford Village Elementary School received a grant of \$1,649.00 to spruce up a courtyard on the premises with plants and bushes and the Bedford Hills Elementary School received \$2,000.00 to help create a garden infrastructure which will provide the basis for growing and learning about healthy foods. On a smaller scale, we replaced several of the planting containers in the Village. Serious consideration was given to developing a trail off of Guard Hill Rd in memory of Mrs. Waller. Instead, a decision was made to contribute travel expenses in the amount of \$1,500.00 annually to underwrite travel related costs for 2 delegates to the NATIONAL AFFAIRS LEGISLATION meeting in Washington. The funds will come from Mrs. Waller's gift of \$20,000.00 to the Bedford Garden Club.

In conclusion, it was a very productive and gratifying year for the Project Review Committee and I am very grateful to all the members who assisted with this task, specifically, Kirk Ferguson, Louise Talbot, Melissa Selby, and Joyce Espy.

Other ideas being considered are a contribution to the Caramoor Garden Guild. The head of the Garden Guild, Betsy Atkins, will b~ contacted ASAP. We have approximately \$9,551.00 in our C& E budget to donate and \$20,000.00 is the amount of Mrs. Waller's donation to the club. I encouraged all members who had candidates proposed and accepted for membership to attend the meetings with their new members.

The planning of Under a Tuscan Sun began in March of 2005. After Betsy Atkins helped secure the Italian Pavilion and Reception Tent at Caramoor for our location, we focused on developing a theme that would compliment the Italian setting of Caramoor and lend itself to writing a creative and imaginative schedule. Once we settled on our theme, Under a Tuscan Sun, and the Flower Show Committee was formed, we began to tackle the job of writing the schedule. While it was a lengthy process, requiring the approval of a GCA panel of schedule reviewers, the creative component of schedule writing was a fun collaboration. Varner Redmon and Dee Edgar did a masterful job writing the Horticulture Division, creating challenging and imaginative classes that played to our Club's strengths. Didi Woodhull lent her creative hand and (photographer's) eye to writing the photography division and Dominique Buaron contributed her expertise and flair to the writing of the Flower Arranging classes. Melissa Vail and Caroline Niemczyk created our Education and Conservation exhibit, Protecting Our Water Supply; a theme that directly related to the GCA 2005 conservation theme - Water. The schedule received final GCA approval in September 2005 and an approved draft was distributed at the October meeting. The perfect Tuscan images used in our formal schedule and throughout the Show on everything from class signs, to preview Party invitations, to aprons were designed by our art director Lela Philip. Thank you, Lela for creating the Show's Tuscan look and feel. It was at this point in early January 2006 that the process of readying the Club and filling the classes began. Horticulture Class Consultants Dee Edgar, Varner Redmon, Anne Miller, Louisa Tiné, Gilda McGarry, and Anne McDuffie and Flower Arranging Class Consultants, Dominique Buaron, Carole Rice, Mimi Lines, Susan McDowell, and Louise Talbot took charge of answering questions and clarifying rules for the exhibitors. Horticulture and Flower Arranging workshops emphasizing a particular aspect of the Flower Show schedule were put together by Varner Redmon, Dee Edgar, Bonnie Trotta and Wendy Cushman. Liza Clymer, as Program Chair, lined up fascinating lecturers all of whom spoke on some aspect of Italian garden design and architecture. Photography chair Didi Woodhull organized a photography workshop giving both budding and seasoned photographers insights into successful garden photography. Those attending these workshops and lectures were undoubtedly enriched by the content and quality of the presentations.

In the months leading up to the Show we focused on staging: the placement of the classes and creating a Tuscan look under the tent. Lela Philip's and Liza Clymer's artistic eye, design sense and tireless support were a tremendous help in this process. For the entrance Lela painted two exquisite canvases of Italian settings and Liza Clymer created an evocative Tuscan vignette, complete with a red Vespa and an al fresco picnic for two. Their work really set the mood. The other important task of lining up judging panels and passers was expertly handled by Chairwomen, Ann McDuffie and Helen Parker respectively. Thank you Ann and Helen, you brought much needed wisdom and sage

advice to this task Along with these Flower Show details there was the Preview party, auction, judges' luncheon, publicity and signage to consider. Denise Santomero, Suzy Beatty and Kirk Ferguson threw a spectacular party, and Lindsay Matthews, Beth Stem and the auctioneers Mimi and Steve Lines orchestrated a wonderfully successful live and silent auction. Connie Hamilton was instrumental in our other fund raising effort, the sale and framing of the Georgia Whitman's Bedford Oak prints. Mary Finnegan and Mary Helen Kennedy hosted a lovely luncheon for the judges and provided delicious sustenance for everyone working and exhibiting on June 1st. Anne Putman did a brilliant job of handling our publicity, publishing several articles in The Record Review, one of which was a featured ,Guest Editor column. Allison Ryan and Leslie Wortmann created our handsome class signs, show schedules, and general signage.

The week had arrived. On Wednesday many dedicated and hard working members helped to set up and the Photography Division was judged at 4:00 that afternoon. It was an impressive group of 25 photographs, expertly mounted and presented by photography chair, Didi Woodhull. June first was here. To those of you on hand that day working as passers, runners, and helpers, thank you for pitching in. You all helped maintain the brimming scene of managed and lively chaos. Passing was completed by 11:00 am and judging began promptly at 1:00. We were delighted to see so many of our members exhibit and win so many awards. Leslie Wortmann received an honorable mention for her arrangement in Class I, Arte in Fiore and co-entrants Lela Philip and Carol Rice were awarded a third place in Class II, Baci. Lela and Carol, and Leslie are deserving of further applause as the classes they exhibited in received a Judges Commendation, given only when the entire class is of exceptional merit. For her table setting picnic for two in Class III, AI Fresco Nonie Reynders was awarded a second place and Dominique Buaron received a second place award for her entry in Class I, La Festa. In Class IV La Prima Volta, the novice challenge class beautifully organized by Susan McDowell, Wendy Cushman and Cindy Swank, were awarded first and second place respectively. Honorable mentions were awarded to our other emerging talents, Lindsay Pinchot and Daphne Root. It was an impressive showing for the Bedford Garden Club as the flower arranging entries from other Clubs were very competitive. Congratulations to all of you. In Division II Horticulture, the quality and variety of the well-groomed horticulture were excellent. There were 88 entries alone in the Class I Tutti I Fiori the cut specimen class and what a beautiful display of spring flowering vines, branches, shrubs and flowers it was. A Judge's commendation was given to this outstanding class as well as to a subdivision of clematis. In this class BGC received 26 awards comprised of 12 firsts, 4 seconds, 5 thirds, and 5 honorable mentions as follows: In Class II, Le Foglie, Bitsy Tatnall was awarded a second place and co-entrants Dominique Buaron and Heather Langham received an honorable mention. In Class V, Le Statue Verdi a first place was awarded to Suzanne Bowers. Second place was won by Varner Redmon, Suzanne Bowers, and Dee Edgar with two entries. Nancy Vincent, Lela Philip, and Heather Langham were awarded third place. In Class III, Insalata Mista, Bonnie Trotta was awarded second place and Linda Wison, along with coentrants Nancy Vincent and Heather Langham were awarded third place. Class IV, Un Piccolo Giardino, was awarded a Judges Commendation for excellence of the entries and co-entrants Virginia Maybank and Anne Miller won the Horticulture Best In Show Award for their delightful and oh so Tuscan, Piccolo Giardino. Dee Edgar was awarded the second place and Lela Philip, along with co-entrants Dominique Buaron and Nonie Reynders, and

co-entrants Lynne Goodhue and Mimi Lines were awarded honorable mentions. It was an outstanding class of entries as recognized by the judges and captured in miniature the essence of our show's theme. Class VI, Perfezione, the par class, was yet another outstanding class for the quality and variety of entries. Dee Edgar, Nancy Vincent, Lela Philip, Libby Mossman, Joyce Espy, and Dee Edgar with two entries, won first place. Dominique Buaron was awarded a second place. Congratulations to Nanny Wyeth for winning first place and for being awarded the difficult to achieve Catherine Beattie Medal for her remarkable forty year old cactus. The medal is awarded for a horticultural entry distinguished by its vibrancy, prime condition, and perfection of grooming.

The education and conservation committee members Melissa Vail, Caroline Niemczyk, Lynne Goodhue, Mimi Lines, Shirley Bianco, Denise Santomero, Anne Putnam, and Mimi Mitchell are to be thanked and applauded for their outstanding exhibit, Protecting Our Water Supply. It was awarded the Marion Thompson Fuller Brown Award given to an exhibit of exceptional educational and visual merit which increases the public's knowledge and awareness of our environment.

Perhaps one of the Show's most endearing and poignant exhibits was the children's class 'Cucina dei Bambini'. The children grew plants from seed, tubers, and cuttings. The display of their 21 plants captured the spirit and the budding interest of our young growers. If our Flower Show did nothing more than spark in our children an interest in horticulture and respect for our natural surroundings, we will have accomplished much. Our children are the future stewards of our environment; and for their stellar effort our children and grand children are to be complimented and congratulated. The children's class resonated with the judges. 'Cucina dei Bambini' was awarded a judges commendation.

IN MEMORIUM

JOAN BRANCH (1901 – 2006)



On July 22nd, 2006, the Bedford Garden Club lost a valued member and long time Bedford resident. The picture in the paper did not do Joan justice. Her good friends do not need to be reminded of that tall (very tall) striking blonde in snappy clothes with the warm smile.

She reacted passionately to causes or subjects dear to her. Though she considered herself a Maine New Englander, Bedford was her beloved home. She welcomed new arrivals to Bedford but sometimes was disappointed by their lack of appreciation of country traditions. She watched with horror as the cottage across the road was burned down to make room for a McMansion. How lucky that she did not see yet another fence and electric gate installed at a neighbor's property. Recent changes in Bedford (traffic, subdivisions, etc.) were very distressing to her. Joan attended Town meetings to express her concerns, hoping to moderate the rapid change. She was very supportive of work the Garden Club was doing on this very subject.

As a young married woman the natural progression for a Rippowan graduate was to become a member of the Bedford Garden Club. Here she joined her mother's friends and was particularly influenced by Willie Waller who was a great champion of conservation. She liked the "people side" of things: events, lectures, house tours and flower shows. She worked on many committees relating to these activities.

Through the Garden Club, Joan met the landscape architect Alice Ireys. Mrs. Ireys helped Joan with the layout for her pool and terraces. Here Joan could be found, the chicest gardener one ever saw, in pink shorts with rolled brimmed straw hat, gloves and trowel in hand. She planted and divided while her husband Ben pruned the boxwood.

Although she referred to Hydrangeas as "Hyder-rangeas" and the occasional low flying helicopter as a "helia-copter", neither hindered her at crossword puzzles. She once announced that she'd had a colostomy – no, no she'd had a *colonoscopy*! A real character, Joan had great elegance and punctuated everything with that wonderful contagious laugh. A marvelous woman, a true friend.

Joan loved having friends drop in. She was often found in her "book room" where the shelves were filled with volumes on the colonial era, biographies, and histories of Maine, Massachusetts, and old New York. She loved to entertain friends at dinner parties,

cocktails, or over lunch at the Club. Joan was the undisputed queen of the tea sandwich and also a great cookie maker. Her gifts of Christmas cookies were always elegantly presented. For many years in the summertime she'd end her days sitting on the porch surrounded by pots of flowers in full bloom, enjoying the sunset for many years with Ben or with close friends and family.

BY-LAWS OF THE BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB, INC.

Last Revised 2007

The BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB wrote its first By-laws in 1911. It is one of the twelve Founder Clubs which in 1913 founded The Garden Club of America.

Article I

Name

This Association shall be known as the BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB, INC.

Article II

Object

The object of the Club shall be to stimulate knowledge and love of gardening among amateurs, to aid in the protection of native plants and birds, and to encourage civic planting and conservation.

Article III

Directors

- 1. The control and conduct of the property and business of the Club shall be vested in a Board of Directors comprised of six members. All directors shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the members of the Club present, or by proxy, at the Annual Meeting of members, including any adjournment thereof, except that vacancies occurring during the year may be temporarily filled by the Board until the next Annual Meeting of members.
- 2. Meetings. The Board of Directors shall meet annually immediately following the Annual Meeting of Members and shall elect officers.* The Board of Directors shall meet at such other dates throughout the year as it may determine.

^{*} Incorporation requires a Board of Directors. The membership elects the directors, who then elect the officers. However, the Nominating Committee, in proposing candidates for the Board, will recommend those whom they propose for specific office (to be shown in parentheses on the slate). It can be assumed that the recommendations of the membership will be followed by the Board.

The Board of Directors will consult with and work with the Executive Committee as described in our By-laws.

3. Quorum of Board of Directors. Fifty percent of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business in any meeting of the directors.

Officers

The officers of the Club shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected by the Board of Directors to serve two years or until their successors are elected. Three officers, the President, First Vice-President, and Corresponding Secretary, shall be elected on the odd year; the Second Vice-President, the Recording Secretary, and the Treasurer on the even year. No President shall hold office for more than four years in succession.

Article IV

President

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club, and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, shall appoint the Chairmen of all Committees, shall arrange for the orientation of new members, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by action of the Club or the Executive Committee, and as pertain to the Office of President, including acting as a legal Trustee of all Club finances. The Vice-President, or in her absence the Second Vice-President, shall have all the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President in case of her absence or disability.

Article V

Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be custodian of all funds, shall disburse all money, shall collect all dues and receive donations and income from special projects. She shall also act as a legal Trustee of all Club finances. She shall present a report at all Regular Meetings and a duly audited Annual Report at the Annual Meeting.

Article VI

Secretaries

The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, shall conduct the correspondence of the Club and notify the Garden Club of America of any changes in membership.

The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings, and act as a legal Trustee of all Club finances.

Article VII

Executive Committee

- 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the six officers of the Club (the Board of Directors), the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, four members from the Club at large, and upon invitation of the Executive Committee, the Chairmen of Special Committees. In the absence of the Chairman of a Standing Committee or a Special Committee, the Committee's Vice-Chairman shall serve. Subject to these By-laws and to any action taken by the members of the Club at any Annual or Special Meeting, the affairs and business of the Club, the electing of its members and the disbursement of its funds shall be in charge of this Committee.
- 2. The four members from the Club at large shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to serve for one year only, or until their successors are elected.
- 3. During the year, there must be a minimum of eight monthly meetings of the Executive Committee, and five days' written notice shall be given to each member. Seven of its members shall constitute a quorum. Special Meetings may be called by the President or any five members of the Committee.
- 4. The Executive Committee or the President shall submit at each regular meeting of the Club a short report of the affairs of the Club, or such report as the Club may direct.
- 5. The Board of Directors shall have power, in case of a vacancy in any office provided for under Article III or in the elected membership of the Executive Committee, to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.
- 6. Any member who has special business she may wish to present to the Executive Committee, is privileged to bring it before a meeting of the Executive Committee, after having notified the Corresponding Secretary of her intention.
- 7. The Executive Committee shall have power to deal with all infringements of the rules of the Club.
- 8. (a) An officer of the Club who shall be absent for three successive meetings without providing a report or explanation satisfactory to the Executive Committee shall be deemed to have resigned.
 - (b) If a Standing Committee is not represented at three successive meetings by a Chairman or Vice-Chairman or by a report of the Committee presented by the Secretary, the Chairman of such Committee shall have deemed to have resigned.

- (c) A member at large must present an explanation satisfactory to the Executive Committee for her absence from three successive meetings.
- 9. Order of business for the Executive Committee shall be as follows:
 - Minutes of the Committee.
 - Treasurer's Report.
 - Reports of both Secretaries.
 - Reports of Standing Committees.
 - Election of new members.
 - Reports of Special Committees.
 - Unfinished business.
 - New business.

Article VIII

Nominating Committee

- 1. This Committee shall consist of five members. The Chairman shall be appointed in October by the President in consultation with the Executive Committee. Two members shall be appointed from the Executive Committee and three from the Club at large. The Chairman will become a member of the Executive Committee. She and her committee will serve for that calendar year.
- 2. The Committee shall nominate a ticket of candidates for the Board of Directors and four members at large and shall notify the Corresponding Secretary, who shall mail a list of candidates so nominated to each member of the Club at least ten days before the Annual Meeting. This committee may also assist the President or President-elect in appointments of all Standing and Special Committees.

Article IX

Custodian

There will be a Custodian, appointed by the President, whose duties it shall be to have the care and custody of all files, records and archives and all other properties of the Club (except funds and securities) when turned over to her by the Officers and Chairmen of Committees.

Article X

Standing Committees

The Chairman of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President as soon as may be after the Annual Meeting and announced at the next regular meeting of the members. The members of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of such Committee after consultation with the President.

There shall be the following Standing Committees:

- 1. Program It shall be the duty of this Committee to arrange programs for all meetings covering and consistent with the work and interests of the Standing Committees, and other interests and projects of the Club, to arrange dates and places of meetings subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, and to prepare notices of meetings for the Corresponding Secretary three weeks in advance.
- 2. Membership It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive the names of candidates for membership, to pass on the eligibility of the candidates and to present their names to the Executive Committee, and to inform the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of any changes in membership.
- 3. Exhibitions (Known as Flower Show by GCA). It shall be the duty of this Committee to be responsible for flower arranging and for providing workshops for the members. There shall be at least one exhibition each year.
- 4. Conservation and Civic Affairs It shall be the duty of this Committee to encourage the wise use and sound management of our natural resources both locally and nationally; to encourage the setting aside and maintenance of natural areas; and to stimulate an interest in conservation in the community. It shall also be the duty of this Committee to have a representative present at meetings of the Town Board, the Planning Board, and the Zoning Board of Appeals, when the subject of its meeting is relative to the interests and objectives of the Club. It should acquaint itself with the local zoning ordinances, and keep the Club informed of pertinent pending changes or variances, promote interest in community betterment by such projects as roadside and other civic planting, control of litter, elimination of billboards, etc., and work to preserve the integrity, stability and beauty of this area.
- 5. Horticulture It shall be the duty of this Committee to stimulate the knowledge and love of horticulture among the members; to institute courses in horticulture for members, and to cooperate with local horticulture programs.

6. Garden History and Design – it shall be the duty of this Committee to educate the Members about American landscape and garden design, to demonstrate how American Garden history is and has always been an integral part of the cultural and social life of the communities in which these gardens exist, and to continue to add to the GCA Collection at the Archives of American Gardens by researching, documenting and photographing important American gardens - past and present, large and small, simple or complex, classical or vernacular.

Article XI

Meetings

1. Annual Meeting – The Club shall hold an Annual Meeting of the members for the election of Directors and the four members of the Executive Committee from the Club at large and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. This meeting shall be held in June at such date, hour and place as may be designated by the Board of Directors. Order of business for the Annual Meeting shall be as follows:

Minutes of last Annual Meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

Reports of both secretaries.

Reports of Standing Committees.

Reports of such special Committees as may be designated by the President.

Unfinished business.

President's Report.

Report of the Nominating Committee.

Election of Board of Directors and Members at Large.

Nominations from the floor may precede the elections and a plurality of votes shall elect.

New business.

2. Regular Meetings – A minimum of seven Regular Meetings shall be held each year. The places and the dates proposed by the Program Committee shall be approved by the Executive Committee.

Order of Business for Regular Meetings shall be as follows:

Minutes of last meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

Any reports at the direction of the President.

- 3. At least ten days' notice in writing shall be given each member of all meetings except Special Meetings.
- 4. Special Meetings Special Meetings may be called by the President or at the written request of any five members, sent to the Corresponding Secretary, stating the object for which such meeting is called. The Corresponding Secretary shall notify all members in writing of the date and object of such meeting, giving not less than three days' notice, and no other business than that stated in the notice shall be transacted at a Special Meeting.
- 5. Twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Club.
- 6. Members who shall fail to attend the meetings of the Club for three consecutive meetings without satisfactory explanation in writing to the Corresponding Secretary may be dropped from membership in the Club except as provided under Article VII, Section 7.

Article XII

Members

- 1. Admission to membership in the Club shall be limited to those owning property and residing in Northern Westchester County, or renting in this area for a minimum of two years, and exhibiting a strong interest in horticulture, flower arranging, or conservation and civic affairs or garden history and design.
- 2. The total membership excluding Honorary, Privileged and Affiliate Members shall not exceed our quota of 125 members of which the total of Associate Members shall not exceed 25 and the combined total of Active and Sustaining Members shall not exceed 100.
- 3. There shall be six classes of membership:
 - a. Honorary Members. Persons of Distinction who have rendered outstanding service to the Club over a period of years and so are eligible for this high honor.
 - b. Active Members. This category constitutes the working members of the Club. They shall attend meetings regularly, serve on committees, and take part in the projects of the Club.

- c. Associate Members. Associate Members shall have full privileges of the Club, including the power of voting. Their attendance at the Regular Meetings and participation in any active work of the Club is optional. Associate Members shall not exceed 25 in number and shall be limited to those who have been Active Members of the Club for at least 10 years and have served with distinction.
- d. Sustaining Members. Members who have completed ten years of satisfactory service and who are no longer desirous or able to participate in our Club's activities, are eligible for this membership at the discretion of the Executive Committee. These members shall have the privilege of attending Garden Club of America lectures, open teas, obtaining Visiting Garden information and will receive the Bulletin. They may attend meetings of the Bedford Garden Club but may not vote, chair any of the five Standing Committees, or hold office.
- e. Affiliate Members. Affiliate Membership may be granted at the discretion of her Club's Board to any member in good standing who has moved to another area or who is no longer active because of a compelling reason.
 - 1. An Affiliate member may not represent her Club as a delegate of a Zone or Annual Meeting.
 - 2. The Bedford Garden Club Affiliate Member is an active member of The Garden Club of America. She may attend lectures, enjoy the use of the Headquarters, have Visiting Garden privileges and receive the Garden Club of America Bulletin. She may attend all Bedford Garden Club functions but may not vote, chair any committee or hold office.
- f. Privileged Membership shall be granted to any person, male or female, who has been helpful to and shown interest in the Bedford Garden Club, but is not eligible for regular membership. This membership shall not exceed seven in number at any one time. These members shall be proposed to the Membership Committee in the usual way and acted upon in conjunction with the Executive Committee. They may participate in Club activities and attend meetings, but they shall not hold office or be eligible to vote. They shall not be considered members of the Garden Club of America and shall not pay dues.

Article XIII

New Members

- 1. The first step in proposing a new member is to contact the Membership Committee Chairman who will explain the procedure.
- 2. A candidate of membership shall be proposed and seconded in writing by members of the Club. The letters of the proposer and seconder together with three letters from members by whom the candidate is well known shall be sent to the Chairman of the Membership Committee. The six officers and those on the Membership Committee may not write these recommendations.
- 3. A member may propose only one and second only one candidate for membership and may write only three endorsing letters during a Club year. A member may not write for a relative for membership in the Club. A member may not propose, second or endorse names for membership until she herself has been a member for one year.
- 4. Candidates shall be considered by the Membership Committee in the order of the submission of their names together with the letters of their proposers, seconders and three endorsing letters as above provided, and no candidate shall be considered until all the requirements of this By-law shall have been complied with.
- 5. Former members and children of former or present members whose names are proposed for membership shall be considered prior to other candidates. Former members who desire to be reinstated need only be proposed and seconded in writing by members. The six Officers and those on the Membership Committee may not write these recommendations. Reinstated members shall have the original date of membership, resignation and reentry listed in the Yearbook.
- 6. Candidates duly proposed and presented as provided for above shall be voted on by the Executive Committee for admission to the Club. Voting shall be by secret ballot. Two adverse votes shall exclude.
- 7. Active Members are expected to serve on one of the following committees: Horticulture, Exhibitions, or Conservation and Civic Affairs or Garden History and Design unless excused by the Executive Committee for extenuating circumstances.
- 8. In conformity with the Garden Club of America policy regarding dual membership, incoming members of the Bedford Garden Club shall not hold membership in two Garden Club of America's Clubs situated in one locality.

Article XIV

Resignation

Resignation from membership shall be made to the Membership Chairman in writing.

Article XV

Annual Dues

Dues are subject to change at the discretion of the Executive Committee and the Garden Club of America.

All dues include the dues of the Garden Club of America. All members who shall have failed to pay these dues within a month of the second notice shall cease to be members of the Club, except as provided under Article VII, Section 7.

Article XVI

Guests

Members may bring their house guests to any meeting of the Club except Annual or Special Meetings. Persons living in the neighborhood who are not members of the Bedford Garden Club are not entitled to attend meetings except with the approval of the Membership Chairman and the President. The Hostess should be consulted when a meeting is held in a member's house.

Article XVII

Amendments

These By-laws may be amended at an Annual or Special Meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting. No amendment shall be considered unless the Corresponding Secretary shall have mailed a copy thereof to each member of the Club at least ten days before the meeting.

Article XVIII

Disposition of Funds

No part of the assets of the Club shall inure to the benefit of any member of the Club. In the event of the dissolution of the Club, all remaining funds shall be turned over to the Garden Club of America.

Article XIX

<u>Policy</u>

Any service rendered to the Club by a member should be provided at cost with no profit to that member.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSTESSES

- (1) It is the responsibility of the Chairman of Hostesses to appoint a Head Hostess and four cohostesses for each Garden Club meeting, in addition to the member in whose house the meeting is held.
 - (a) In the event that the appointed Head Hostess cannot fulfill her responsibilities, she is expected to get a replacement and report the change to the Chairman of Hostesses at least two months before her assigned meeting.
 - (b) The Head Hostess and her co-hostesses make and work out all details and arrangements involving hospitality for the meeting and tea.
 - (c) The Head Hostess should confer first with the member in whose house the meeting is being held to ascertain what will be needed in the way of chairs, coat racks, flowers, food, china, silver, direction signs, parking attendant and table for the President.
 - (d) The Head Hostess then makes arrangements with her co-hostesses to work out details and decide what will be provided for refreshments. She contacts the Treasurer for money from the Hostess Fund, which is provided through the dues, as an assessment of \$5 per member.
 - (e) The Head Hostess should contact the Corresponding Secretary a few days before the meeting to find out how many acceptances have been received. She should not purchase any plastic cups, napkins, plates, etc., until our supply is exhausted. The Custodian is in charge of these items as well as the large coffee and hot water (for tea) pots, which are needed upon occasions.
- (2) Co-hostesses may be asked to come the morning of the meeting to help set up chairs or to stay after the meeting to help the hostess put her house back in order.
 - (a) If a co-hostess is unable to fulfill her responsibilities, she is to get a substitute and report the change to her Head Hostess at least two months before her assigned meeting.
- (3) Flower arrangements are the responsibility of the hostesses. If the help of the Flower Arranging Committee is desired, it should be requested in plenty of time.
- (4) All members are asked in turn to be hostesses and it is hoped that all meeting and tea arrangements will be kept as simple as possible.
- (5) During their term of office, the President, two Secretaries, Treasurer and Chairmen of Civic Affairs and Conservation, Flower Arranging, Horticulture and Programs will be excluded from being asked to be hostesses.
