PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2022-2023

It has been my great honor to serve as President of the Bedford Garden Club for the past two years and we culminated on an extraordinary high note, coinciding with our co-hosting of the GCA's Zone III leadership meeting. Entitled "Take Me Home Country Roads", the meeting was Co-Chaired by BGC members Heather Langham and Nancy Kronenberg in partnership with the Rusticus Garden Club, and whose dedicated meticulous planning for every facet of the 3-day event involved virtually every member of the BGC. Graced by three days of beautiful weather, 120 of our national and regional GCA members attended lectures, meetings, garden tours, private dinners, and an exceptional, juried flower Show.

The Flower Show, which was held in Bedford's Historical Hall and open to the community, was Chaired by Leslie Wortmann, and included a Horticulture Show Co-Chaired by Virginia Maybank and Tina Winchester, and a Photography Show, Chaired by Anita Stockbridge. BGC members Brett Cameron and Dana Worlock arranged flowers, arrays of myrtle topiaries and native wildflowers in tents on the Village Green where luncheons were held. BGC member Varner Redmon, overseeing our gardening volunteers, ensured that our Community Gardens were at their best.

An Art Show featuring botanical-themed paintings by BGC and Rusticus club members was curated by member Christopher Brescia at the Bedford Playhouse where lectures and meetings were held. A highlight of the gathering was an on-stage conversation between BGC members Joyce Corrigan and Martha Stewart followed by a curated tour of Martha's gardens, greenhouses and grounds, capped by a caviar reception in her horse barn.

The Zone III event was a great success and truly showed Bedford at its very best.

Special Projects

This year saw the completion of a number of ambitious BGC projects which were begun in 2022.

Our new **BGC Website** was launched through the leadership of Nancy Vincent and was beautifully enhanced by images provided by Anita Stockbridge's Photography Committee.

A permanent **BGC Archive** was established at St. Matthews by our Historian Susan West, who streamlined over a century of club materials. **BGC institutional policies** were reviewed and updated including membership categories. A beautiful new **Cancer**

Center Garden, envisioned and spearheaded by BGC member Cecilia Wolfson, and designed by Betsy Mitchell, was established at Northern Westchester Hospital. The garden, which features pollinator-friendly native plants and trees and specially designed, wheelchair-accessible furniture for patients, families and staff, was funded by last year's *Light My Fire* Benefit.

The Revival of a **Native Wildflower Garden** at Ward Pound Ridge Reservation was also successfully launched. The garden, which was originally dedicated in the 1950's to honor our BGC founders Eloise Luquer and Delia Marble, had fallen into a neglected state but was vividly reimagined and revived through the efforts of BGC members Varner Redmon, Betsy Mitchell and Susan Burke. Partnering with Westchester County Park's Taro Ietaka, and *Friends of the Trailside Museum*, the group expanded the garden's footprint, removed decades of invasives, cleared waterways, installed stone walkways, added new plant materials, and designed and ordered plant labels, rustic benches and a new bridge for the garden's 8,000 annual visitors.

Standing Committees:

Our Civic Affairs and Conservation Committee Co-Chairs Ellen Conrad and Jayni Chase led members on another exceptionally stellar year. Working closely with the Bedford Audubon Society, they established native seedling programs; continued their public awareness campaign on invasives education and eradication; promoted legislative efforts leading to successful protections for Birds, Bees and Native plants; heightened community awareness on the dangers of plastics as

well as practical demonstrations on easy-to-implement plastic alternatives to use at home; and oversaw an "I Love My Park Day" at the historic John Jay Homestead.

The BGC continues to take great pride in the ongoing efforts of our **National Affairs and Legislation** Chair, Author and Physician Diane Lewis, to advance GCA's national environmental policies.

Floral Design Committee Chairman Leslie Wortmann led a banner year of activities including Flower Arranging Workshops, the annual Bring Your Own Vase BYOV event, *Greensday*, tablescapes with Brett Cameron consisting of lovely flowers and refreshments for each of our members meetings, and the unprecedentedly successful Zone III Flower Show.

Garden History and Design Co-Chairs Susan Burke, Wendy Cushman and Varner Redmon continued building on Varner's original *Smithsonian Institution Historic Gardens Project*, documenting the local Gardens of Susan Burke, Denise Santomero, and Leslie Needham.

Horticulture Committee Co-Chairs Virginia Maybank and Tina Winchester teamed up to offer a highly popular series of hands-on workshops including: strategies for germinating seeds, forcing bulbs, tree planting and pruning, bee hotels, the annual plant exchange, and, with the Conservation Committee, a winter native seed-growing project for Bedford Audubon.

Membership Chair Cynthia Mas and her committee strategized ways to streamline our BGC membership categories and introduced one of the largest and most distinguished classes of new members to the BGC. Emily Grand welcomed these exceptional "Seedlings" with a special cocktail celebration, and garden visits including the annual visit to see the Stockbridge family's Primroses.

Photography Chair Anita Stockbridge led her large, enthusiastic membership in field workshops and on-line critiques, the Zone III Photography Show and coordinated BGC member-submissions for our new Website.

Programs Co-Chairs Kim Morris and Michaela Beitzel arranged a series of wonderfully popular members programs which

included an Irish Gardens lecture and Whiskey tasting evening; Authors presenting new books on formal gardens, flower arranging, garden history and design; Storm King Art Center's native plants program, and a special community evening on *Ten Tomatoes that Changed the World!*

Special Committees

Awards Committee chair Natica von Althann did an impeccable job identifying the contributions of key members and gave a brilliant presentation at our annual meeting.

Joyce Corrigan, head of **Communications** and our favorite reporter-at-large has kept us connected to local and national publications while being consistently cheerful and efficient; seeming to welcome every assignment.

Varner Redmon continued to Chair **Trips and Visiting Gardens** as well as lovingly guide BGC Volunteers in maintaining our **Community Gardens:** The Courthouse Garden, the Sunken Garden at Caramoor, the Sundial Garden at John Jay Homestead, and now the Native Plant Garden at Ward Pound Ridge. All of these efforts were enhanced by the expertise and dedication of Betsy Mitchell.

Cecilia Wolfson has ably overseen our **Grants and Scholarships** programs, stretching funds raised at last year's benefit to support diverse internships and exciting projects, including the new Cancer Center Garden which she created, in organizations throughout Westchester.

Historian Susan West, who this year re-discovered the original foundry casts for the Eloise Luquer GCA Medal and established the long-wished-for Permanent Archive, also launched the innovative *BGC History Minute* which has become a much anticipated and essential part of each of our regular member's meetings.

Our **Nature Series** continued; highlights included a visit to the Billion Oyster Project, Maple Sugaring, a woodland hike to see Spring Ephemerals; and a Spring Migration outing led by Bedford Audubon.

The **Yearbook**, **superbly** maintained by Liddy Baker, continues to be a vital information resource for our membership.

Club Administration

STANDING COMMITTEES

Conservation and Civic Affairs Committee 2022/2023

This year the Conservation Committee focused on a number of different legislative efforts, at both the federal and state level. Projects included organizing two educational seminars: one on the pending Birds and Bees Protection Act in NYS Legislature and the second, led by Judith Encyk, ED of Beyond Plastics, on the Packaging Production and Recycling Infrastructure Act. Both pieces of legislation, if passed, will be much needed trend setters for restricting the use of neonicotinoids and reducing the use of plastics. Each seminar was open to all Zone III GCA members. The third lobbying effort was a successful campaign to urge Governor Hochul to sign a Proclamation declaring April as Native Plant Month.

Invasives Removal

We have also continued educating and engaging club members on the identification and removal of invasive plants. The summer began with site visits to 19 members' gardens led by Rod Christie and Budd Verveka of Mianus River Gorge to flag invasives. Those visits were followed up with an extensive report describing the invasives particular to each property, with instructions on best removal methods. In late spring, Budd led a workshop with homeowners and several local landscapers on the specific use of invasive removal tools, such as blow torches, herbicide dabbers, root removing devices, weed whackers and more.

Native Plant Identification, Seed Sowing, Growing and Learning

As a follow-up to the invasive removal project, the Conservation Committee worked jointly with the Horticulture Committee to educate and engage members on native plants options, especially to replace invasives. Hort led two winter workshops demonstrating how to germinate native seeds during the winter and then how to "pick the seedlings out" for transplant to larger containers with the goal of planting the mature "plugs" in a founders' plot mid-summer. BGC member, Beth Crowell has generously offered some of her beautiful land for a founders' plot. The seeds produced by the native plants in the founder plot will be used to grow another generation of native plants during the winter of 2023.

This Spring we held two workshops, both with Mathew McDowell, the Wildflower Island Curator at Teatown, which is an education center located on a 1,000-acre nature preserve in Ossining, NY. The first workshop was a tour of the Teatown Wildflower Island and it was a magical opportunity to experience a woodland setting as it was before invasives or deer damage. Ephemerals were growing in profusion – lady slippers, white snake root, buttercup, American black elderberry, swamp marigold, native impatience, Jack-in-the-Pulpit, native and oak leaf viburnum, highbush blueberry, Canada mayflower, star flower, cinnamon ferns, trout lily, trillium sessile, Donny rattlesnake, native roses, gentian, wild geranium, Solomon, Jacobs ladder, sensitive ferns, male berry, fringed polygala, hazelnut, creeping phlox, wild oats, columbine, fire pink, crested iris, pinkster bloom azalea, field pussytoes, black chokeberry, monkshood aka wolfsbane, witch hazel, twin leaf, and more. Later in the spring Mathew McDowell, led a workshop on "Rewilding – Gardening with Natives." Mathew is an expert in regional native plants and ecological-based gardening. He discussed how to locate, grow and maintain some valuable natives such as early ephemerals, phlox divaricate penstemon digitalis and solidago speciose, among others.

Love My Park Day

We worked together with our fellow Bedford GCA garden club, Rusticus, and Bedford 2030. After meeting on-sight with our club member, Emily Grand, the ED of the Friends of John Jay Homestead and the Park Director, Heather Iannuci, we established that there were three areas we could potentially make significant progress – a small apple orchard, the foundation of an historic building and a small grove of young trees that were being strangled by invasive vines. Early in the week, we removed fencing that surrounded each of the apple trees in preparation. We were lucky to have advice and help from Taro Ietaka, our Westchester County Park Recreation Supervisor, and deeply knowledgeable about invasives and natives management. Then on Saturday, May 6th Bedford 2030 brought their invasive removal tools and we had over 20 volunteers show up ready to work. Every one of our volunteers expressed great joy and satisfaction this project, working together we achieved even more than we had expected.

Conservation Showcase

The Committee created a February showcase to teach our members how to be a "conservationist at home" by displaying non-toxic household cleaning products and a multiple of alternatives to the plethora of plastic in our homes. We had reusable glass spray bottles for mixing cleaners from concentrate; bamboo towels and sheets; kitchen and outdoor compost bins; tools for invasive removal (a blow torch, herbicide dabbers...); bamboo toilet paper; laundry soap sheets; dishwasher eco-tablets; glass and silicone food storage bags; organic cotton produce bags (for marketing and home); electric/battery operated gardening power tools (to dramatically lower air and noise pollution), and more.

In an effort to ensure meaningful action in our members' homes, we created a document with hyperlinks to websites for more explanation and purchasing information.

A slightly edited version of our showcase was presented to the entire Bedford community in April at the BGC booth as part of the B2030 Tree Forum event. The booth also had a beautiful display of native plants which inspired community members to sign two petitions, one in support of the Birds and Bees Protection Act (94 signatures) and the other in support of a Proclamation that April would be Native Plant Month in NYS (88 signatures). Our booth was hailed as having beauty and brains.

We are still looking to restore the stable and house on the Sarles Street campus.

MIANUS RIVER GORGE PRESERVE: No Report

WESTMORELAND SANCTUARY:

Westmoreland Sanctuary has continued to grow with a land acquisition of 28.8 acres of land at 815 feet above sea level, it is the highest point in Bedford. The Sanctuary is also building a 2,500 square foot Environmental Education Center that is schedule to be completed in December 2023. This Center will be heated and cooled with geothermal and have both a rain garden and greenhouse for native plant propagation. Three conservation highlights from this year include successful seed propagation of 50 American elm, an international red list endangered species, an increase of pink lady slipper blooms from 40 to 50 with a total number of 60 individual plants, and finally one-year successful trial of mountain laurel regeneration. In education we taught over 11,000 students.

National Affairs and Legislation (NAL)

Zone III was very well represented this year at the Garden Club of America NAL meetings in Washington DC. We had representatives from almost all 23 clubs, there were 19 of us. It was BGC's Conservation and Civic Affairs committee that organized meetings with Senator Gillibrand and Senate Leader, Chuck Schumer. Senator Gillibrand offered each of us the opportunity to voice which of the GCA legislative issues meant the most to us, and why. It was an exceptionally vibrant exchanging of ideas, passions, facts and solutions. Leader Schumer doesn't meet with visitors to the Capital, as the Leader he has to stay on the floor of the senate. He runs the agenda. But not only did he send a brilliant young aide to hear all of our concerns, he also popped in with a professional

On the State level, we continued to work closely with Dan Raichel of NRDC to lobby our state officials to pass the Birds and Bees Protection Act, which will prohibit the use of neonicotinoid

coated seeds for corn, wheat, and soybean as well as non-agricultural turf and ornamental use. The advocacy process continues to be a significant learning experience, especially with respect to state advocacy.

Branch Out!

No Report

In 2022 - 2023 Virginia Maybank and Heather Langham collaborated with the Town of Bedford and Kevin Winn, Commissioner, Department of Public Works, on a street tree planting project that was funded by the Town. The street tree planting project was coordinated and phased with the installation of new sidewalks in the downtown area. The entire tree and sidewalk project was completed this spring.

Twenty-six new trees were planted in the Bedford Hills Hamlet, five different species selected by Nina Bassuk at Cornell for size, suitability to our urban location and ability to thrive in Structured Soil. Our intention is to give the new trees the best possible planting conditions and we selected trees that are most likely to grow strong and healthy. Replacing the monoculture of the honey locusts, we chose five different species to improve biodiversity and visual impact:

- 5 Syringa Reticulata Ivory Silk
- 7 Maple, Acer x freemanii 'Armstrong'
- 4 Hawthorn Crataegus viridis, 'Winter King'
- 4 Pear Prunus x Tripoldei 'Chastity'
- 6 Tupelo Nyssa sylvatica 'Tupelo Tower'

Branch Out! initiated and funded the replacement of a Pin Oak (mutilated by the power company) in the heart of Bedford Village. The approval process included the Town of Bedford and Historic District Review Commission.

A 4-inch caliber Native Dogwood (Cornus Florida) was selected for the location below power lines. Branch Out! selected the tree and paid for it and the Town delivered and planted the tree. Branch Out! has had great success partnering and collaborating with the Town of Bedford and in particular Kevin Winn Commissioner, Department of Public Works and Chris Soi, Commissioner Parks and Recreation.

Ward Pound Ridge Reservation

Native Plant Garden

I want to talk a little bit about a fabulous new Bedford Garden Club project in a public park. The Executive Committee voted to allocate \$25,000 from our Endowment Fund for the renovation/reimagining/restoration of the Luquer Marble Wildflower Garden in Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, and our wonderful BGC member, Susan Burke, has generously offered to match that amount. In addition, another wonderful member, Betsy Mitchell, native-plant gardens expert, has offered her invaluable services to this project pro bono!

In the fall of 2021, our president, Beth Sachs, was asked by Taro Ietaka, Westchester County's Director of Conservation and Education, if the BGC could help with restoration of the Luquer Marble Wildflower Garden behind the Trailside Museum in Ward Pound Ridge Reservation. Miss Luquer and Miss Marble were not only founding members of the BGC but were very active in the early 20th-century national conservation movement that led to the founding of the GCA. In our community, these two amazing women were instrumental in the formation of the Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, in creating nature trails there, hiring a naturalist, building the Trailside Museum, etc. In 1957, as a memorial to these two wonderful women, the Bedford Garden Club donated the funds to create a Wildflower Garden behind the Trailside Museum. A beautiful stone bridge over a woodland stream was built and wildflowers were planted by our members. For many years, Bedford Garden Club members tended this garden, adding plants, pulling weeds, etc. In 1976, when the deer population explosion made gardening without a fence difficult, the BGC paid for what was then a state-of-the-art chain-link fence to protect the garden.

But the garden once again needed our help. We began the process of renewal, re-designing and restoring the Wildflower Garden at the Trailside Museum using current knowledge and best practices of native plant gardening, protection of insect habitats, and woodland management.

We removed a galvanized chain-link fence that surrounded parts of the original garden. We replaced this with a deer fence of 8' high field wire mesh galvanized and painted black. Native perennials and shrubs were planted for long-season interest and wildlife habitat. We re-designed the paths, created an additional entrance/exit to the garden, and plan to replace an unattractive wooden bridge and walkway.

The steering committee is interested in re-fashioning the garden as a Native Plant Garden, with the ultimate goal of developing a native-plant curriculum for the several thousand school children who visit the site annually.

This project will involve the whole garden club: Hort, conservation and Exhibition Chairs will work with eradicating invasives, sowing native seeds - a good fit for the GCA Olmsted Project. Last year, approximately 95,000 weekend visitors were recorded at WPRR.

We want the Bedford Garden Club to continue the work of its founders by making their wildflower garden beautiful again, so that it may inspire a new generation with a love of our native "flowers, birds, trees and shrubs."

TRIBUTE to Miss Luquer at the original dedication of the Wildflower Garden

"Miss Luquer desired to give to others, especially city dwellers, the opportunity to learn a love of flowers, birds, trees and shrubs, which she felt had been hers when she wandered, as a girl, over St. Matthew's fields. This, together with her understanding of conservation, prompted her deep interest in a Nature and Trailside Museum. Miss Delia Marble shared her vision, and together they were instrumental in founding the Bedford Garden Club's Nature Trail and Trailside Museum at the Ward Pound Ridge Reservation. Her devotion, and Miss Marble's to this project, and her unfailing faith in its future, have been largely responsible for its success."

Located in the heart of Bedford, **Westmoreland Sanctuary** offers a natural, educational environment to engage in and learn about the Sanctuary's environs. Through hands-on field work, Westmoreland Sanctuary interns learned how to identify and weed invasive species, transplant, test water quality in ponds and lakes, lead pond ecology, animal care, and guided nature hike programs.

Located just North of the hamlet of Bedford is **Bedford Audubon** where an equally vibrant educational environment offers visitors to engage in their natural surroundings. This year's intern focused his work on the concept of "built environments" (which include both the garden and the preserve) and the ways in which people can positively impact ecosystems within such environments.

Bedford Presbyterian Church is continuing to think about its commitment to the environment (the care of God's creation) through various projects on its campus. **The pollinator garden** was installed at the entrance of the Church and to the right and left of the walkway. It is an excellent complement as we think about the variety of ways we can contribute to the ecosystems in which we live. The beds were prepared with the help of the Church's youth group. They planted black-eyed Susan, creeping flox, echinacea amongst other native plants from a seed mix at that time.

Northern Westchester Hospital's Cancer Center garden sits in front of Northwell Health Cancer Institute in Mt Kisco, New York. The garden was installed over 15 years ago (2005) when the building was erected. While the hospital maintains the garden as a part of campus upkeep, the space was in need of the expertise of a landscape architect and replanting with native plants. Betsy

Mitchell oversaw the design and replanting of the garden in the Spring of 2023 as well as new furniture for the garden. The project, which is as much as it is about patience and appreciating the process, was completed in June, 2023.

Field-work acts as an experiential learning activity to compliment traditional environmental science pedagogy, increase student engagement, and further participant comprehension and retention. In addition, as a capstone project, students helped organize and lead Westmoreland's inaugural Summer Kick-Off Barbeque Fundraiser! The event was a success and students raised over \$800 to support Westmoreland's current conservation restoration projects including enriching a riparian stream habitat

for indicator species like the Brook Trout, as well as protecting IUCN Red List species like the American Elm.

Located just North of the hamlet of Bedford is **Bedford Audubon** where an equally vibrant educational environment offers visitors the option to engage in their natural surroundings. This year's intern focused his work on the concept of "built environments" (which include both the garden and the preserve) and the ways in which people can positively impact ecosystems within such environments. He applied this concept with a final tour of Bedford Audubon's Leon Levy Native Garden as well as the preserve.

The Conservation and Civic Affairs Committee created a pilot project led by BGC in partnership with Mianus River Gorge to educate the public on invasive species, natives and the significance of biodiversity. In the first phase, we anticipate the participation by members of the Bedford Garden Club and interested landowners affiliated with Mianus River Gorge. The intern, hired by Mianus River Gorge, continues to work on organizing data collected from landowners as to existence of both invasive and native plants on their property, training of experts to perform site visits; and assistance in creating educational materials as to best practices for invasive removal and management; and assistance in identifying sources for effective disposal of invasive plants.

Northern Westchester Hospital's Cancer Center Garden sits in front of Northwell Health Cancer Institute in Mt Kisco, New York. The garden was installed over 15 years ago (2005) when the building was erected. While the hospital maintains the garden as a part of campus upkeep, the space was in need of the expertise of a landscape architect and replanting with native plants. Betsy Mitchell oversaw the design and replanting of the garden in the Spring of 2023 (attached) as well as new furniture for the garden. The project was completed in June, 2023.

All the Club's photographs and albums have been gathered for Varner and Nancy to review for digitizing over the summer. This will be especially crucial for our work in floral design, which is otherwise so difficult to document.

The perspective this work provides will be a foundation for good decision making in the future. I am proud of what we have accomplished, and look forward to further progress in the future.

2022-2023

There was a flurry of media coverage in Bedford's Record Review during the Fall 2022 season. In early September, member Joyce Corrigan profiled another BGC member, Dana Worlock, floral designer creative force behind her Pound Ridge headquartered Hedgerow Flower Farm + Studio; the focus was on her creative process and her increasing incorporation of wildflowers and meadows into her landscape designs.

In early October, the Record Review covered the BGC-hosted author talk with William Alexander about his book *Ten Tomatoes That Changed the World* at Historical Hall. Joyce previewed the event with an interview with Alexander. Tomatoes, prized ornamentals since the Renaissance, were out in force at the book talk: highlighted by a glorious floral & tomato arrangement by member Ginger Getz

Later in October Joyce covered the re-imagining of the Bedford Free Library's garden by renowned landscape designer and author Page Dickey. While the garden renovation was a Rusticus Garden Club Project, credit was given where it was due: the Library itself was founded in 1902 by none other than Eloise Luqueur, botanist, botanical illustrator and, of course, a founding member of the Bedford Garden Club in 1911.

In 2023 our media coverage has been defined by Live Events. In January, then President Beth Sachs arranged for Bedford Playhouse event where we hosted the creative team behind the Storm King Art Center the open-air museum located in New Windsor, New York. Joyce Corrigan moderated a discussion with David Collens, former director of Storm King and Mike Seamans, the current Director of Facilities. Storm King not only contains the largest collection of contemporary outdoor sculptures in the US but is also an extraordinary arboretum filled with spectacular specimen plantings throughout. Curating the trees, plants and native grasses is arguably as big a job as installing the 200 lb steel sculptures. Our Playhouse talk was in anticipation of a BGC Visit to Storm King which alas was postponed twice due to inclement weather. Surely it will happen in the coming year!

Speaking of Live Events, after more than 2 years of intense preparation, the BGC and Rusticus hosted the long-awaited Bedford Village - based Zone III meeting June 20-22 and, on every front, scored a major victory. In their June 16th issue The Record Review ran a cover story previewing the event---with the 4 chairs, BGC's Heather Langham and Nancy Kronenberg and Rusticus' Melissa Fleming and Cathy Biddle on the cover in Melissa's spectacular blossoming cherry tree garden. The RR reporter interviewed Leslie Wortmann and Kerry Wilson who spearheaded the super successful Flower Show which was open to the public.

On Tuesday, June 21, "live" at Bedford Playhouse, the Zone III meeting included Joyce Corrigan interviewing BGC Member Martha Stewart about her unparalleled Cantitoe Corners, which she has been "growing" for 21 years. Martha prepared a slide show of photos chronicling the garden's evolution. Following the talk, the Zone III representatives were whisked off to Martha's for

WEBSITE - INTERNAL CLUB COMMUNICATIONS 2022–2023

In early 2021 President Beth Sachs encouraged BGC to create a more vibrant and professional website with a public presence. Emily Grand offered to help me, Nancy, as she had had experience with the Friends of John Jay Homestead. Christine Frisbee, a rather new member, also offered her experience and help. And so, it began.

The initial tasks went as follows: Emily created a questionnaire to determine our BGC members' expectations; Nancy studied the parameters for websites on the GCA website, talked with other Zone III clubs whose websites had appealing public pages, and created an RFP which was sent to two recommended, professional website developers.

Having completed the questionnaire, Emily needed to refocus on her "day job"; Beth Sachs jumped in to fill the void. Of the two designers, Beth was definite that our choice should be Maureen Winter, who had designed websites for Millbrook and Rusticus Garden Clubs as well as one for Marsh Sanctuary whose website was created by two BGC members, Anita Stockbridge and Heather Langham. The fact that Maureen used the Weebly platform was an added benefit as our original website developed by Varner Redmon used the Weebly Platform, a familiar one. A website name was decided on and several were registered with GoDaddy: thebgc.org, bedfordgardenclubny.org and bedfordgardenclub.com. The price for thebgc.com shot to the sky and we abandoned registering it. In the end we used both thebgc.org (Members site) and bedfordgardenclubny.org (Public site). Our progress was slowed by a lack of an official document to prove our club's non-profit status. Without it we could not register with TechSoup for significant discounts. Liddy Baker remembered the details of the Club receiving the non-profit status in 1996 and filled out the request for a copy of the original letter.

Finally, with the help from our congressman's district office, we succeeded in obtaining this important documentation.

When CC Marrone, a brand new 2022 member, heard of our website development efforts, she immediately offered us her help as a professional in branding organizations. This was not just an interesting exercise but was a help in focusing us on the essence of our club as we attempted to incorporate this attribute into our website.

Beth Sachs developed a formula for each committee chair to follow in describing a committee. In mid-September Varner Redmon agreed to join the website team. She stepped in, and from then on Maureen, Varner and Nancy spent many agreeable hours deciding on visuals and developing content. IN MMORIAM

Polly Harrison Winans Finn April 12, 1925 – May 7, 2023

"Almost heaven..." sings John Denver, and this is exactly how Polly Winans Finn, our oldest and longest serving Club member, described her childhood in Bedford on Harris Road. His phrase "Life is old there" certainly rang true, as there was water only if it was carried from the pond, a single tub for all in the kitchen, and a congenial two-seater privy "with lots of magazines" in the woods. Polly delighted to show its wonders to her "fancy little friends from the City" when they came to visit. There was also a spring-fed pond with the raft she and her brother made from barrels lashed under an old barn door. There were trees to climb, and places to explore, very similar to how Marilen described Mrs. Waller's childhood at nearby Tanrackin Farm.

"Country roads, take me home to the place I belong" was Polly's lifelong refrain, the background for the Victory Garden Cannery organized by her mother during the Depression. Polly worked there as a girl and described the experience as part of a wonderful and comforting routine, which provided a sureness that gave children confidence during a time of great uncertainty. Her childhood home began as just a weekend and summer place. Her family would head back to the City with the trunk of the car loaded with flowers and plants and her father complaining, "Why do we have to bring the country in?" even as he worked a garden larger than an acre while singing hymns and growing 37 vegetables⁴. Although too young to have had the "Misty taste of moonshine" in Denver's song, Polly remembered Prohibition, describing how the Embassy Club on the Armonk Road turned into a speakeasy at night⁵.

She went to Village parades and celebrated Independence Day at the Bedford Golf and Tennis Club, where her father had started the fireworks. It began with the minister reading a prayer, then part of the Declaration of Independence was read, with the fireworks finally coming after dark. "We were aware of the reason why we were there." Polly said. "It wasn't just a lovely summer party with fireworks. We knew what it was about." Denver's lyric "All my memories gather round her" was never more precious than at this event, the highlight of summers in Bedford.

As the years went by, bigger roads intruded slowly and insistently in life on Harris Road. Polly watched the Saw Mill Parkway creep north from Hawthorne Circle, and then Interstate 684 barreled relentlessly through rural acres. Although her father tried to tame the Interstate by using it as a dirt running track as it was being built⁷, the disruption was clear. Forces of change were at hand, and surely fortified her devotion to the town planning and conservation work of the Garden Club, where she served in virtually every area as an officer, Committee member, and delegate. She was Assistant Treasurer, Hort Co-Chair, Programs Chair, Second V-P, Admissions Chair, Nominating Chair, Historian, liaison to the GCA Endowment Fund Committee. delegate to the GCA Annual Meeting, the Club's speaker on Labiatae (thyme) in 1992, and, of some interest to us at the moment, our delegate to the 1967 Zone III meeting. Phew! But such a list says nothing about the quality of her contributions. It's never what you do as much as how you do it. Polly wore her heritage consciously and proudly but lightly. There was never any hint of pretense about her. She inflected what she did and who she was with tremendous warmth, zest, humor, and flair. She knew what was really important to her and her neighbors whose lifetimes were spent on Bedford's country roads, and felt the

values that "Harris Road" stood for had become threatened. Initially dubbed "Harris Street" by our first Town Fathers to identify a path through the wilderness, rural values in her time had become diminished by encroaching urban lifestyles. Her mother, in opposition, persuaded the Town to emphasize its rural character by minimizing its significance. It was not a street, just a road. It was this rural character that Polly celebrated throughout her life. Next week, as we gather for our Zone III meeting, listen carefully. If you do, you may hear her beautiful soprano voice singing "Take me home, country roads."

BY-LAWS OF THE BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB, INC.

Last Revised 2021

The BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB wrote its first By-laws in 1911. It is one of the twelve Founder Clubs which in 1913 founded The Garden Club of America.

Article I Name

This Association shall be known as the BEDFORD GARDEN CLUB, INC.

Article II Object

The object of the Club shall be to stimulate knowledge and love of gardening among amateurs, to aid in the protection of native plants and birds, and to encourage civic planting and conservation.

Article III Directors

 The control and conduct of the property and business of the Club shall be vested in a Board of Directors comprised of six members. All directors shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the members of the Club present, or by proxy, at the Annual Meeting of members, including any adjournment thereof, except that vacancies occurring during the year may be temporarily filled by the Board until the next Annual Meeting of members.

- 2. Meetings. The Board of Directors shall meet annually immediately following the Annual Meeting of Members and shall elect officers.* The Board of Directors shall meet at such other dates throughout the year as it may determine.
- 3. Quorum of Board of Directors. Fifty percent of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business in any meeting of the directors.

Officers

The officers of the Club shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected by the Board of Directors to serve two years or until their successors are elected. Three officers, the President, First Vice-President, and Corresponding Secretary, shall be elected on the odd year; the Second Vice-President, the Recording Secretary, and the Treasurer on the even year. No President shall hold office for more than four years in succession.

Article IV President

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club, and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, shall appoint the Chairmen of all Committees, shall arrange for the

^{*} Incorporation requires a Board of Directors. The membership elects the directors, who then elect the officers. However, the Nominating Committee, in proposing candidates for the Board, will recommend those whom they propose for specific office (to be shown in parentheses on the slate). It can be assumed that the recommendations of the membership will be followed by the Board.

The Board of Directors will consult with and work with the Executive Committee as described in our By-laws.

orientation of new members, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by action of the Club or the Executive Committee, and as pertain to the Office of President, including acting as a legal Trustee of all Club finances. The Vice-President, or in her absence the Second Vice-President, shall have all the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President in case of her absence or disability.

Article V Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be custodian of all funds, shall disburse all money, shall collect all dues and receive donations and income from special projects. She shall also act as a legal Trustee of all Club finances. She shall present a report at all Regular Meetings and a duly audited Annual Report at the Annual Meeting.

Article VI Secretaries

The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, shall conduct the correspondence of the Club and notify the Garden Club of America of any changes in membership.

The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings, and act as a legal Trustee of all Club finances.

Article VII Executive Committee

 The Executive Committee shall consist of the six officers of the Club (the Board of Directors), the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, and four members from the Club at large. If there are co-chairmen of a Standing Committee, the co-chairmen shall jointly determine what their vote shall be. At the discretion of the President, the Chairmen of Special Committees may be invited to attend any or all Executive Committee Meetings but shall not be voting members of the Executive Committee. Subject to these By-laws and to any action taken by the members of the Club at any Annual or Special Meeting, the affairs and business of the Club, the electing of its members and the disbursement of its funds shall be in charge of this Committee.

- 2. The four members from the Club at large shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to serve for one year only, or until their successors are elected.
- 3. During the year, there must be a minimum of six monthly meetings of the Executive Committee, and five days' written or electronic notice shall be given to each member. Nine of its members shall constitute a quorum. Special Meetings may be called by the President or any five members of the Committee.
- 4. The Executive Committee or the President shall submit at each regular meeting of the Club a short report of the affairs of the Club, or such report as the Club may direct.
- The Board of Directors shall have power, in case of a vacancy in any office provided for under Article III or in the elected membership of the Executive Committee, to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.
- 6. Any member, who has special business she may wish to present to the Executive Committee, is privileged to bring it before a meeting of the Executive Committee, after having notified the Corresponding Secretary of her intention.
- 7. The Executive Committee shall have power to deal with all infringements of the rules of the Club.
- 8. (a) An officer of the Club who shall be absent for three successive meetings without providing a report or explanation

satisfactory to the Executive Committee shall be deemed to have resigned.

- (b) If a Standing Committee is not represented at three successive meetings by a Chairman or Vice-Chairman or by a report of the Committee presented by the Secretary, the Chairman of such Committee shall have deemed to have resigned.
- (c) A member at large must present an explanation satisfactory to the Executive Committee for her absence from three successive meetings.
- 9. Order of business for the Executive Committee shall be as follows:
 - Minutes of the Committee.
 - Treasurer's Report.
 - Reports of both Secretaries.
 - Reports of Standing Committees.
 - Election of new members.
 - Reports of Special Committees.
 - Unfinished business.
 - New business.

Article VIII Nominating Committee

- This Committee shall consist of five members. The Chairman shall be appointed in October by the President in consultation with the Executive Committee. Two members shall be appointed from the Executive Committee and three from the Club at large. The Chairman will become a member of the Executive Committee. She and her committee will serve for that calendar year.
- 2. The Committee shall nominate a ticket of candidates for the Board of Directors and four members at large and shall notify

the Corresponding Secretary, who shall mail a list of candidates so nominated to each member of the Club at least ten days before the Annual Meeting. This committee may also assist the President or President-elect in appointments of all Standing and Special Committees.

Article IX Custodian

There will be a Custodian, appointed by the President, whose duties it shall be to have the care and custody of all files, records and archives and all other properties of the Club (except funds and securities) when turned over to her by the Officers and Chairmen of Committees.

Article X Standing Committees

The Chairman of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President as soon as may be after the Annual Meeting and announced at the next regular meeting of the members. The members of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of such Committee after consultation with the President.

There shall be the following Standing Committees:

- 1. Program It shall be the duty of this Committee to arrange programs for all meetings covering and consistent with the work and interests of the Standing Committees, and other interests and projects of the Club, to arrange dates and places of meetings subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, and to prepare notices of meetings for the Corresponding Secretary three weeks in advance.
- 2. Membership It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive the names of candidates for membership, to pass on the eligibility of the candidates and to present their names to the

- Executive Committee, and to inform the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of any changes in membership.
- 3. Exhibitions (Known as Flower Show by GCA). It shall be the duty of this Committee to be responsible for flower arranging and for providing workshops for the members. There shall be at least one exhibition each year.
- 4. Conservation and Civic Affairs It shall be the duty of this Committee to encourage the wise and sound management of our natural resources both locally and nationally; to encourage the setting aside and maintenance of natural areas; to stimulate an interest in conservation in the community; to promote interest in community improvement and to work to preserve the integrity, stability and beauty of this area.
- 5. Horticulture It shall be the duty of this Committee to stimulate the knowledge and love of horticulture among the members; to institute courses in horticulture for members, and to cooperate with local horticulture programs.
- 6. Garden History and Design it shall be the duty of this Committee to educate the Members about American landscape and garden design, to demonstrate how American Garden history is and has always been an integral part of the cultural and social life of the communities in which these gardens exist, and to continue to add to the GCA Collection at the Archives of American Gardens by researching, documenting and photographing important American gardens past and present, large and small, simple or complex, classical or vernacular.
- 7. Photography It shall be the duty of this committee to further the knowledge and love of gardening and the natural landscape through photography and to promote the art and science of photography at all skill levels through education.

Article XI Meetings

1. Annual Meeting – The Club shall hold an Annual Meeting of the members for the election of Directors and the four members of the Executive Committee from the Club at large and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. This meeting shall be held in June at such date, hour and place as may be designated by the Board of Directors. Order of business for the Annual Meeting shall be as follows:

Minutes of last Annual Meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

Reports of both secretaries.

Reports of Standing Committees.

Reports of such special Committees as may be designated by the President.

Unfinished business.

President's Report.

Report of the Nominating Committee.

Election of Board of Directors and Members at Large.

Nominations from the floor may precede the elections and a plurality of votes shall elect.

New business.

2. Regular Meetings – A minimum of seven Regular Meetings shall be held each year. The places and the dates proposed by the Program Committee shall be approved by the Executive Committee.

Order of Business for Regular Meetings shall be as follows:

Minutes of last meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

Any reports at the direction of the President.

- 3. At least ten days' written or electronic notice shall be given each member of all meetings except Special Meetings.
- 4. Special Meetings Special Meetings may be called by the President or at the written request of any five members, sent to the Corresponding Secretary, stating the object for which such meeting is called. The Corresponding Secretary shall notify all members in writing of the date and object of such meeting, giving not less than three days' notice, and no other business than that stated in the notice shall be transacted at a Special Meeting.
- 5. Twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Club.
- 6. Our Club depends on the active participation of its membership. Members are expected to attend the monthly meetings and to be active in the Standing Committee of their choosing. Members are asked to support and respect the work of their fellow members who organize and plan for each Bedford Garden Club event. In the instance where it is not possible to attend meetings on a regular basis, members are asked to contribute to the Club in ways that will be mutually beneficial.

Article XII Members

1. Admission to membership in the Club shall be limited to those owning property and residing in Northern Westchester County, or who have rented property for a minimum of two years in this area, and exhibiting a strong interest in

- horticulture, flower arranging, or conservation and civic affairs or garden history and design.
- 2. The total membership excluding Affiliate Members shall not exceed our quota of 130 members of which the total of Active Members shall not exceed 115 and the total of Sustaining Members shall not exceed 15.
- 3. There shall be three classes of membership.
 - a. Active Members. This category constitutes the working members of the Club. They shall attend meetings regularly, serve on at least one committee, and take part in the projects of the Club. They can chair a committee, vote and hold office if they desire.
 - b. Sustaining Members. Members who have completed fifteen years of Active service and who are no longer desirous or able to participate in our Club's activities, are eligible for this membership at the discretion of the Executive Committee. These members shall have the privileges offered by the Garden Club of America. They may attend meetings of the Bedford Garden Club but may not vote, write letters for new members, chair a committee or hold office.
 - c. Affiliate Members. Affiliate Membership may be granted upon request to any member in good standing who has moved to another area.
 - 1. An Affiliate member may not represent her Club as a delegate of a Zone or Annual Meeting.
 - 2. The Bedford Garden Club Affiliate Member is an active member of the Garden Club of America and shall have the privileges offered by the GCA. The Affiliate Member may attend Bedford Garden Club

functions but may not vote, chair any committee, hold office, or write letters for new members.

Article XIII New Members

- 1. The first step in proposing a new member is to contact the Membership Committee Chairman who will explain the procedure.
- 2. A candidate of membership shall be proposed and seconded in writing by members of the Club. The letters of the proposer and seconder together with three letters from members by whom the candidate is well known shall be sent to the Chairman of the Membership Committee. Those on the Membership Committee may not write these recommendations.
- 3. A member may propose only one and second only one candidate for membership and may write only three endorsing letters during a Club year. A member may not write for a relative for membership in the Club. A member may not propose, second or endorse names for membership until she herself has been a member for six months.
- 4. Candidates shall be considered by the Membership Committee in the order of the submission of their names together with the letters of their proposers, seconders and three endorsing letters as above provided, and no candidate shall be considered until all the requirements of this By-law shall have been complied with.
- 5. Former members and children of former or present members whose names are proposed for membership shall be considered prior to other candidates. Former members who desire to be reinstated need only be proposed and seconded in writing by members. The six Officers and those on the Membership Committee may not write these recommendations. Reinstated

members shall have the original date of membership, resignation and reentry listed in the Yearbook.

- 6. Candidates duly proposed and presented as provided for above shall be voted on by the Executive Committee for admission to the Club. Voting shall be by secret ballot. Two adverse votes shall exclude.
- 7. Active Members are expected to serve on at least one of the following committees: Horticulture, Exhibitions, or Conservation and Civic Affairs or Garden History and Design unless excused by the Executive Committee for extenuating circumstances.
- 8. In conformity with the Garden Club of America policy regarding dual membership, incoming members of the Bedford Garden Club shall not hold membership in two Garden Club of America's Clubs situated in one locality.

Article XIV Resignation

Resignation from membership shall be made to the Membership Chairman in writing.

Article XV Annual Dues

Dues are subject to change at the discretion of the Executive Committee and the Garden Club of America.

All dues include the dues of the Garden Club of America. All members who shall have failed to pay these dues within a month of the second notice shall cease to be members of the Club, except as provided under Article VII, Section 7.

Article XVI Guests

Members may bring their house guests to any meeting of the Club except Annual or Special Meetings. Persons living in the neighborhood who are not members of the Bedford Garden Club are not entitled to attend meetings except with the approval of the Membership Chairman and the President. The Hostess should be consulted when a meeting is held in a member's house.

Article XVII Amendments

These By-laws may be amended at an Annual or Special Meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting. No amendment shall be considered unless the Corresponding Secretary shall have mailed or electronically mailed a copy thereof to each member of the Club at least ten days before the meeting.

Article XVIII Disposition of Funds

No part of the assets of the Club shall inure to the benefit of any member of the Club. In the event of the dissolution of the Club, all remaining funds shall be turned over to the Garden Club of America.

Article XIX Policy

Any service rendered to the Club by a member should be provided at cost with no profit to that member.

The Bedford Garden Club Executive Decisions

5/1/2021 - Letter Writing Guidelines

Bedford Garden Club is encouraged by the GCA to submit letters to organizations on issues which impact the mission of the club and/or the GCA. The goal of our letter writing guidelines is to ensure that our members have an opportunity to submit and review such letters through a fair, timely, transparent and consistent process. If the letter writer so chooses and the letter writer is encouraged to do so, they may ask the President and Chairs of the Standing Committees to review the letter prior to submitting the letter for approval by the Executive Committee. Standing Committee Chairs are expected to provide the letter writer with balanced and constructive observations. Once the letter is submitted, it is deemed to be final, and the President is expected to conduct an orderly review process. Voting members are expected to disclose any issues of personal conflict. The total letter review will not exceed 21 days.

Letter Writing Guidelines:

- **1.** Submission by member(s) of final letter for consideration to the Bedford Garden Club President and Recording Secretary
- **2.** President and Recording Secretary confirm conformity of letter to the Bedford Garden Club's mission.
- **3.** President and Recording Secretary share the letter with the Executive Committee and the membership.
- **4.** Executive Committee and Membership will respond with questions and concerns in writing to the President and Recording Secretary within 10 business days. In the event of an unpreventable timing consideration, the President may ask the Executive Committee for a waiver to shorten the initial time period to less than 10 days, in any event, the initial period will not be less than two days.
- **5.** On the 10th day, The President and Recording Secretary will deliver the final letter and attached comment letters to the Executive Committee. A straw poll will be taken on the 11th day by the voting members of the Executive Committee. If the

- "straw poll" is unanimous, the letter is deemed approved and will be sent. The general membership will be informed of the delivery of the letter.
- **6.** If the "straw poll" is not unanimous, the Executive Committee will have an additional 9 days to review letters before the final vote.
- 7. No later than Day 20 Final Letter is submitted to the Executive Committee and put to a vote
- **8**. The Vote will take the following form:
- A. The vote will take place no later than on Day 20. All votes will be tendered in writing to the President and Recording Secretary.
- B. The vote is a public vote (e.g. names and votes will be disclosed to the Executive Committee after the final tally).
- C. The majority of votes tendered will determine the outcome
- D. The majority will be defined as 75% inclusive of votes tendered. Non-votes will be treated as abstentions.
- E. All voting members of the Executive Committee will be required to vote on the letter (Yes, No, or Abstain).
- **9**. The vote will be tallied the day after the vote or no later than Day 21 by the Recording Secretary and verified by the President.
- **10**. If approved, the final letter will be shared with the general membership of the BGC and sent. If turned down, the letter will be withdrawn.
- **2/6/1991** A motion passed that the BGC would phase out its Honorary Membership because of the difficulty in deciding on eligibility. When there are no longer any members in this category, the By-laws would be changed to reflect this policy.
- **2/2/1989** Vote on granting a leave of absence to a member who is coping with a major illness in her family.
- **1/4/1989** Explanation of Club's longstanding policy that we do not, as a club, send flowers at the time of a member's death.

9/7/1988 - Decision made to set aside \$200/year to save toward the printing of our next History. This item should be budgeted each year. Passed 10/5/88.

7/2/1986 - The Jean Newell Memorial Fund originated as a 1971 bequest of \$6000 to the Bedford Garden Club in 1971 for the purpose of the Friendship Gardens at the Bedford Hills Correctional Facility, or should they cease, for other worthwhile civic projects. The Friendship Gardens project begun in 1958 ended in 1976. The accumulated interest from this fund was used for the John Jay Sun Dial Garden and twice was borrowed as seed money for the Caramoor Flower Show benefits. In these instances, the funds were repaid to the Newell Fund.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSTESSES

- (1) It is the responsibility of the Chairman of Hostesses to appoint a Head Hostess and four co-hostesses for each Garden Club meeting, in addition to the member in whose house the meeting is held.
 - (a) In the event that the appointed Head Hostess cannot fulfill her responsibilities, she is expected to get a replacement and report the change to the Chairman of Hostesses at least two months before her assigned meeting.
 - (b) The Head Hostess and her co-hostesses make and work out all details and arrangements involving hospitality for the meeting and tea.
 - (c) The Head Hostess should confer first with the member in whose house the meeting is being held to ascertain what will be needed in the way of chairs, coat racks, flowers, food, china, silver, direction signs, parking attendant and table for the President.
 - (d) The Head Hostess then makes arrangements with her co-hostesses to work out details and decide what will be provided for refreshments. She contacts the Treasurer for money from the Hostess Fund, which is provided through the dues, as an assessment of \$5 per member.
 - (e) The Head Hostess should contact the Corresponding Secretary a few days before the meeting to find out how many acceptances have been received. She should not purchase any plastic cups, napkins, plates, etc., until our supply is exhausted. The Custodian is in charge of these items as well as the large coffee and hot water (for tea) pots, which are needed upon occasions.

- (2) Co-hostesses may be asked to come the morning of the meeting to help set up chairs or to stay after the meeting to help the hostess put her house back in order.
 - (a) If a co-hostess is unable to fulfill her responsibilities, she is to get a substitute and report the change to her Head Hostess at least two months before her assigned meeting.
- (3) Flower arrangements are the responsibility of the hostesses. If the help of the Flower Arranging Committee is desired, it should be requested in plenty of time.
- (4) All members are asked in turn to be hostesses and it is hoped that all meeting and tea arrangements will be kept as simple as possible.
- (5) During their term of office, the President, two Secretaries, Treasurer and Chairmen of Civic Affairs and Conservation, Flower Arranging, Horticulture and Programs will be excluded from being asked to be hostesses.
